A CHRISTMAS PACKAGE FOR EACH SOLDIER

Information received by the Red Cross headquarters today regarding sending Christmas cartons to those boys from whom no address label has been received, is as follows:

"An individual who should have received a label but who failed to receive it or has lost or destroyed it, may receive a carton not earlier than November 21st upon signing a statement at the Red Cross Christmas Parcel station substantially as follows:

"The undersigned hereby makes application to forward to _____ (name) _____ (organization) American Expeditionary Forces a Christmas Package. The undersigned hereby declares that he or she is the nearest living relative to the United States, of the proposed recipient, that he or she has not received this package label from abroad; and that should such label be received it will not be used, and that to the best of her knowledge and belief only one Christmas parcel will be sent the proposed recipient."

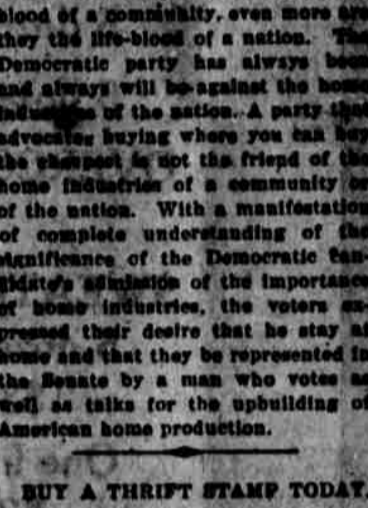
All who make application as above should bring the name, rank, age, serial number, etc. of the proposed recipient as we are required to fill out a blank address label the same as the boys are given over seas. On and after November 21st, the above label will be available for those not receiving their address labels from overseas. The limit of time for sending has been extended to November 30th.

To the County Chairmen of the State Council of Defense for Oregon: A nation declares itself by the manner in which it celebrates its holidays.
