Officers Censured in Hughes Aircraft Report



Charles E. Hughes' report of the aircraft inquiry, made public by Attorney-General Gregory, recommended the trial by court martial of Colonel Edward A. Deeds and the criminal prosecution of Lieutenant-Colonel Jesse G. Vincent and two other officers. Before he became a member of the Aircraft Production Board, Colonel Deeds was connected with the Dayton Engineering Laboratory Company. Lieutenant-Colonel Vincent was vice-president of the Packard Motor Car Company of Detroit.

Change Probable At State Pen

SALEM, Nov. 29.—If Governor Withycombe decides, as a result of a quiet investigation, which he has been making for months at the Oregon State Penitentiary, that the rapid increase in the cost of operation at the prison is due to causes that are avoidable, Warden Chas. A. Murphy will be asked to resign and his successor will be appointed. If a change is made it will be entirely on a basis of the financial management of the prison, and should the governor determine that neither Murphy nor any other man could avoid the increased expenditure of money the present warden will remain at his post. The governor has made this known as the policy he will follow relative to Warden Murphy.

Indications are strong that a change will be made for the governor dropped a remark to the effect that while unusual conditions have caused increased costs at all the state institutions the increase at the penitentiary seems far out of proportion to those of the other institutions.

"Few management and wage cost of administration will be the basis of the change, if any change is made at the prison," said the governor. "I have been watching them at the prison for probably for a year, and if anything the rumors have been making an investigation. Without a very careful consideration of the question in view of conditions that create difficulties at all institutions, it is not fair to say that the increasing costs at the prison are due to mismanagement. It seems, however, that the increased costs are far out of proportion to those at other institutions."

Governor Withycombe has made no secret of his dissatisfaction at the cost of operation at the penitentiary. On the other hand, he has been outspoken in his praise of the morale at the institution and the general conduct of affairs aside from the financial, and has given Warden Murphy credit. This also is added in connection with the distribution of paroles which caused the governor to order an investigation by Attorney General Brown. In this affair the governor has been no respecter of persons and the investigation has been all inclusive, sparing no official or employe from the probe. The indictment of a former grand jury came as part of the investigation, and now the Marion county grand jury is investigating the adjourned at present because of the illness of one member. There are those who believe the governor will make no change in the warden.
