**CALIFORNIA BODY ASKS WOMAN PEACE DELEGATE.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—A plea that a woman be appointed as a delegate to the forthcoming peace conference was sent to President Wilson today by the women's committee of the State Council of Defense.

"We believe that as women have responded with loyalty and patriotism to the responsibilities which the war has put upon them, they should have representation and their point of view given consideration at the time when all the world hopes that treaties may be framed which will be the foundation for the end of all wars," the message said.

## NEW NATIONS INTO WHICH AUSTRIA HUNGARY WILL BE SPLIT UP, WHAT REMAINS OF AUSTRIA AND TWO PROMINENT FIGURES IN CHANGE



This map indicates the principal changes that will result from the dismembering of Austria-Hungary. Some of them had taken place even before Austria accepted the entente allies' drastic armistice conditions, following the lines laid down in President Wilson's fourteen principles. There will be minor changes in the alignment of nationalities and races, but the general trend of national re-organization is shown here.

Thomas G. Masaryk, professor of the University of Prague, president of the Bohemian Political Committee and president of the congress of races subordinate to Germany and Austria, has played an important part in preparing subjects of the German and Austrian rulers for recent developments. At a meeting in Independence Hall, Philadelphia, the congress made a statement of the aspirations of the various races.

Count Karolyi, whose party set up a republic while in control of the situation, has resigned as head of the Hungarian National Council, according to recent reports. He considered that the holding of that position was incompatible with being premier, but he has provisionally taken the portfolio of foreign affairs and will have a big part in coming changes in Hungary.
