HUNS FAILED TO SIZE UP U. S. RIGHT

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY ON THE WESTERN FRONT, Nov. 23.

"Germany's greatest mistake was in underestimating the power of America," declared General von der Lancken Walkenitz, virtual ruler of Belgium during the four years of German occupation, in a remarkable interview with an American civilian just before he left Brussels. "But for that, Germany would have been victorious," continued the German officer. "We have been living in anxious days, but have the situation well in hand now. We shall clear out of Belgium peacefully. It may take Germany 10 or 15 years to pay up the allies' demands, but we will pay."

PEN REGIME SOON CAREFULLY INVESTIGATED

SALEM, Nov. 25.—The probe of the special Marion County grand jury will take on a much wider scope than originally covered in the letter of Governor Withycombe asking for an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the alleged bartering in paroles and conditional pardons. This came to light when District Attorney Max Gehlar, who is handling the special grand jury, said that the probe will widen in its scope to cover every minute detail as to the prison administration, and every official in the slightest way connected with the prison administration, from the governor to the most minor official, will be investigated. Even members of the board of control will come under the investigation. The grand jury has called for the books of the prison.
