COMING TAX COLLECTION BIG PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 2.—

Chaotic conditions in the collection of taxes next year now seem unavoidable. This is according to a treasury statement which has been prepared, commenting on the delay of congress in enacting the pending revenue bill.

This statement, to be made public shortly, will explain why the internal revenue bureau is proceeding with plans to collect taxes under the old law, with its levies far below those proposed in the new measure.

The only way to avoid resorting to collections under the old law, the treasury now believes, is for congress to rush the bill to completion within two weeks. Most house and senate leaders do not believe this possible.

The possibility of having so new, comprehensive program of revenue legislation, and consequently of raising less than the \$6,000,000,000 sought from this source before the end of the fiscal year, June 30th next, has prompted the treasury to consider plans for issuing a quantity of short-term notes, maturing in one year and paying these off from the proceeds of heavier taxes, which would be necessary in 1920.

BIG BUSINESS MERGER NOW BEING FORMED

ATLANTIC CITY, DEC. 2.—Or-

ganization of virtually all industrial and commercial interests of the nation into a single unit to represent business in general will be undertaken at a series of conferences, opening here tomorrow and continuing until Friday, of war service committees of each industrial or trade group formed during the war as a medium for negotiation between the government and their respective businesses. There are more than 300 of these committees each composed of the leaders of the industry or trade, and the conferences are expected to bring together between 2,000 and 2,000 prominent business men to discuss problems of reconstruction, industrial relations after the war, raw materials and their control, price regulation, amended anti-trust legislation, export and import regulations, financial supervision and similar subjects.

It is planned to organize the industries represented by these 300 or more committees into 25 groups, aligned according to interests and finally into ten master groups which will federate in a single organization. The importance of this movement, its organizers say, is that it will effect the largest organization of business interests ever attempted in the United States.

The conference was called by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, which has assisted in the organization of war service committees for each industry to co-operate with the War Industries Board and other government agencies in regulation of production during the war. A number of prominent speakers have been engaged for the general session, and each industrial or trade group has formed its own program of topics for consideration and of speakers.

The principal immediate purpose of the conference will be to determine practical methods by which industry may co-operate more closely with the government during the reconstruction period by a more centralized scheme of organization.

Here are some of the more important questions to be presented for discussion and as the basis for recommendation to the government.

"What method should the government pursue in the cancellation of contracts to insure the least hardship? What should be done with the enormous war plants the government has erected? What conservation measures put into operation in your craft during the war can be continued? How are we to bring about better relations between employers and employees? How can men discharged from the army and navy best be absorbed by industry? How far should American business men go in combining to buy and sell in foreign countries? What aid should American business men give the European countries in their rehabilitation? How closely should business work with the government in studying reconstruction and demobilization plans? What kind of government agencies should be established to deal with reconstruction? What legal methods of means could be introduced in the craft to better stabilize prices during the reconstruction period?"

"What is your financing problem during reconstruction? Do you recommend government aid? On undelivered government orders, what percentage of materials on hand, supplied either by the government or purchased by you for government orders, can be utilized by your craft for commercial purposes during 1919? What is the value of a uniform method of cost accounting for the individual manufacturer and the craft as a whole? What new methods and practices would simplify materials, eliminate waste, reduce number of styles, save materials, without destroying individual creativeness? What propaganda is necessary to educate the retailer and consumer to accept these eliminations and simplifications?"

It is planned also to prepare for the quick assembling of extensive information on industrial and labor conditions for use by business representatives, Congress and the government executive branches in the reconstruction.

INCREASED DUTIES PLANNED FOR HOOVER

PARIS, Dec. 2.—The appointment of Herbert C. Hoover as director of relief, having charge of the entire food and relief administration for the European allies and the United States is under consideration.

It is understood the offer of the position has been made in behalf of the Allies, and is rather favorably regarded by Hoover, altho no announcement has been made.

The general idea of the plan is to centralize the organization under one head so that both the food and tonnage made available by the various Allies would be used under one plan to the best advantage of each of the allied nations.

Part of the plan is that relief ships forming an extensive inter-allied relief fleet shall fly an inter-allied flag, so that the countries receiving relief will feel that it comes from all allies, rather than from any one country.

Hoover, after going to Brussels, probably will go to London, where the plan will be considered further. His party includes Robert Taft, son of the former President, and Dr. Alonso Taylor.

EUGENE, Dec. 2.—Fraternalism which went out of existence as living groups for the men of the University of Oregon with the inauguration of the S. A. T. Pledging of new men has proceeded as usual this year, thereby maintaining the strength of the organizations.
