### FLU EPIDEMIC IS EXPECTED NEXT SEASON

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—Plans for combating another influenza epidemic which is expected to sweep the country in 1919 will be considered by health authorities from all parts of the United States, Canada, and South America today at the forty-fifth annual convention of the American Public Health Association which opens here Dec. 9.

Members of the association say that all the influenza epidemics since 1729 have been recurrent for from two to three years after the initial outbreak. For this reason leading authorities feel convinced that the visitation of 1918 will be repeated in 1919 and probably in 1920. Also it is pointed out that in previous epidemics the second and third outbreaks have been more virulent and attended by a higher mortality rate than were the initial manifestations.

It was early in 1918, according to Dr. W. A. Evans, former health commissioner of Chicago, that the now so-called Spanish influenza made its appearance in Spain, Now

Spain is having its second outbreak, according to Dr. Evans more virulent in form and attended by an alarming death rate.

During the three-day meeting, the methods used in combating the 1918 epidemic in the United States will be thoroughly considered and plans outlined for meeting any future emergency. Among those who will present papers and take part in the discussions are Major W. H. Welch, of the National Medical Corps; Dr. E. C. Rosenow, of the Mayo foundation; Dr. Herman Biggs, Commissioner of the New York State Department of Health, and Dr. A. J. McLaughlin, assistant Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service.

Besides consideration of influenza, many subjects of general interest pertaining to public health during the reconstruction period will be taken up. There will be discussions regarding proper precautions in the care of children to reduce mortality rates, rural sanitation, the effect of fashions on health and the use of narcotics in war times.

### GERMANS WARNED TO TOE THE MARK

WITH THE AMERICANS IN PRUSSIA, Dec. 5.—General Pershing has issued a proclamation to the German inhabitants, specifying the area which will be occupied "under military rule and the authority of the American army."

"Strict and implicit obedience will be exacted from all," says the proclamation. "Nevertheless, law-abiding persons have no reason to fear. The Americans have not come to make war on civilians. The Americans will govern in strict accordance with international law. The inhabitants must abstain from any word, deed or act of hostility. Every act of hostility, violence or disobedience of rules will be punished with the utmost vigor."

The proclamation urges the people to devote themselves to re-establishment of normal conditions in schools, churches, etc., which will not be obstructed, but will be encouraged and protected. It promises that local courts and governing bodies will be continued in operation, so far as possible, under supervision.

#### BARUCH REMONS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 5.—The President has adopted the resignation of Bernard Baruch, Chairman of the War Industries Board, which is to become effective January first. The board will then cease to exist.
