

PLANS WERE MADE FOR BERLIN RAID

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Berlin was to have been bombed by a squadron of eight to 12 super-Handley-Page and De Havilland airplanes on the

night of November 11, the date of the signing of the armistice, according to a number of American aviators who returned on the transport Lapland. Forty fliers had been preparing for weeks at Ford Junction, Sumner, on the English channel to attack the German capital. The distance from Ford Junction to the German capital is about 500 miles.

BREWERS WERE WORKING FOR AID OF ENEMY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—Organization in 1915 of a \$200,000 advertising campaign, by which it was hoped to stop the manufacture in the United States of munitions for the Allies was admitted by Louis N. Hammerling of New York, president of the American Association of Foreign Language Newspapers, testifying before the senate committee investigating activities of brewers and German propagandists.

Edward A. Rumely, recent owner of the New York Evening Mail, and Dr. H. F. Albert, a German propagandist were connected with the campaign by the witness, who declared money for the insertion of the advertising in practically all of the 619 newspapers of the association was contributed largely by Rumely. He said his dealings with Alberts consisted in the collection thru the German propagandist of a portion of the \$200,000 which Rumely contributed. Hammerling denied any connection or acquaintance with former German Ambassador Bernstein, and sought to justify his part in the advertising campaign that he believed the munitions being manufactured in this country were being shipped to Germany.

Asked about the placing of the advertising, Hammerling said the newspaper owned by Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, chairman of the foreign relations committee, published the advertisement without charge. The National Association of Commerce and Labor, a subsidiary of the United States Brewers' Association, Hammerling admitted, paid his organization \$21,640 in 1916 for translating articles on "personal liberty" appearing in foreign language newspapers.

ROBBERS DEVASTATE CHINESE PROVINCES

PEKING, Dec. 5.—From almost every province of China come reports of outrages committed by robbers and some of their recent exploits equal those of the terrible White Wolf who ravaged a huge stretch of territory before meeting a none too timely end.

Shantung is the happy hunting ground of thousands of bandits because of geographical facilities which enable the rascals when pursued by troops to enter adjoining provinces whence they cannot be followed. This state of affairs has been made much worse by General Lung Chikwang, who, after his defeat in Kwang-tung by the southern armies, retreated from the Shantung bandits' fresh levies for his expedition. He secured wholesale a force of 5,000 men by promising to make their leader a brigadier general in the Republican army of China.

Dismantled to find no pay forthcoming, these "robber recruits" com-

menced looting and attacked the Tientsin-Pukow Railway, the line between Peking and Shanghai. Here, however, they met the Shantung troops, and several battles were fought before the bandits were dispersed. The train service was interrupted by the bandits tearing up a portion of the line. General Lung Chi-Kwang denies all responsibility for the misguided activities of his recruits, but the government has prohibited the enlistment of further men before their approval has been given. Such is the state in China today.

POLES CHANGE MIND WITH ATTRACTING

GENEVA, Dec. 6.—The Polish government has sent a ultimatum to Germany asking for the immediate evacuation of Polish territory by German soldiers, who are said to have been committing atrocities, according to the Geneva Journal. If the German answer is not satisfactory, it is added, "most energetic measures" will be taken by the Poles.

WISCONSIN CONGRESSMAN MEET IN INDIAN

LACROSSE, WIS., Dec. 6.—The L. Berger, Socialist Congressman elect, of Milwaukee, and his campaign manager, Louis A. A. have been indicted by the grand jury on 16 counts involving alleged violations of the campaign act, during his senatorial campaign last March.

They are charged with sending thru the mails from Milwaukee, the western district of Wisconsin, copies of the Milwaukee Leader, dated March 6, containing Mr. Berger's platform and also pamphlets.
