R. C. DOING MUCH FOR FLU PATIENTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal. Dec. 20.—While the general public is fairly familiar with the campaign being waged in the larger cities against the epidemic of Spanish influenza, they know little about the desperate battles which are being fought by the Red Cross in dreary and isolated regions far from railroad lines and communication of any kind. Red Cross nurses have answered the call for action in the windswept isolations of sage brush and sand, or penetrated into the bleak hill country with the thermometer at below the zero point. In barren little shanties miles from any town they have ministered, and are ministering, to families where every member was desperately sick; where there are no doctors, no medicines, nothing but the pluck and courage of the nurse sent to relieve the situation. As soon as word of the conditions are received from the nurse, the generosity of the Red Cross instantly is put in operation to rush whatever is called for in the way of medicines, food, clothing and help. There is no Red tape. The Pacific division will rush the materials into Northwestern territory if by so doing it can the quicker reach its destination, and vice versa. Ten thousand pounds of ether were shipped to France by the Red Cross, so our soldiers might have relief from pain.
