

Bumper Wheat Crop Coming Next Season

PORTLAND, Dec. 20.—(Feature page.) An increase of 5.9 per cent is just issued by the bureau of crop estimates in the five states in the United States department of agriculture, place the nation's acreage of wheat sown this fall at 19,027,000 acres, an increase of 3.2 per cent over the area sown a year ago. The condition of the crop is placed at 98.5 per cent, as compared with 79.3 per cent last year, 88.2 per cent in 1916, and a ten year average of 88.2 per cent.

Based on the foregoing acreage and condition figures it is estimated that the total wheat crop of the United States, including both fall and spring wheat for the 1919 crop year, reached the record total of 1,025,800,000 bushels. With the increased acreage expected for spring wheat, it seems very probable, at this date, that the United States total wheat crop of 1919 will amount to more than 1,000,000,000 bushels. The acreage sown to rice is placed at 6,822,000 acres, being an increase in area of 1.7 per cent. Conditions of the rice crop is given as 89.0 per cent, compared with 81.1 per cent last year, 88.8 per cent in 1916, and 81.4 per cent for the ten year average.

HOG ISLAND SHIPYARD INVESTIGATION NOW ON.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 20.—Charles Fox of Hog Island shipyard investigation today estimated the cost of the yard at \$13,300,000. One ship has been delivered and fifty keels laid. The government will decide whether to take over the shipyard or not.

BELGIANS ARE IN FAVOR OF RAIDING HUNS

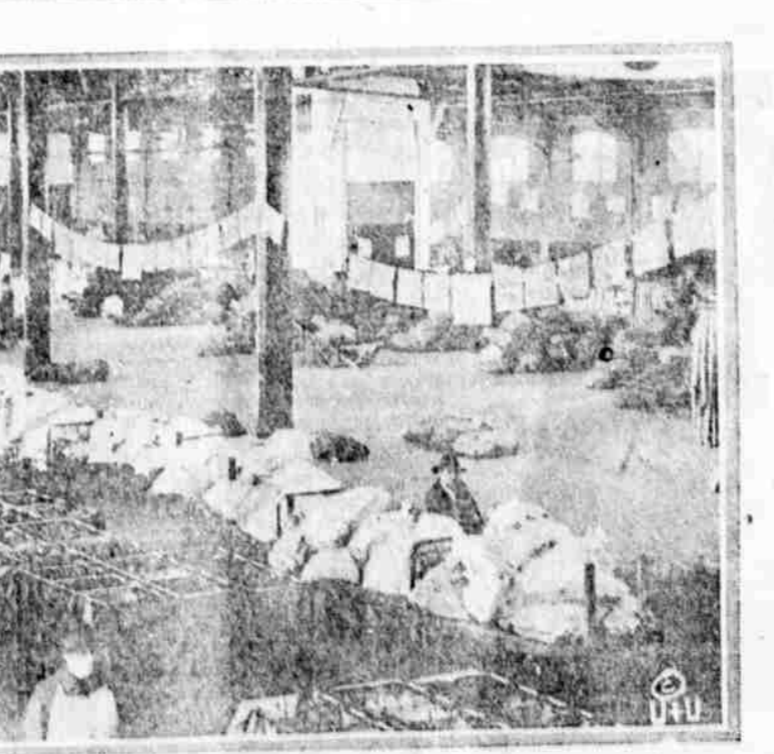
BRUGES, Dec. 20.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The civil population of Belgium is much more bitter toward the Germans than the soldiers who have fought them to a standstill during four years, crushed them, battered them about and washed the Empire during the last 100 months. To us of bitter experience, hate and revenge come from the civilians alone.

A kind little old woman, the owner of a cigar store after selling the correspondent a villainous cheroot, an "ersatz" cigar relic of the German Occupation, launched forth into a violent denunciation of the uninvited guests who made Bruges their home for four years. "This war must not end like this," she said with a vehemence which contrasted greatly with her gentle appearance. "We must go into Germany, they must suffer, expiate." On the day of their departure the German robbed her store of \$500 worth of her best cigars and cigarettes.

On the Grande Place in the shadow of the famous belfry, an irate gentleman was discoursing loudly, gesticulating wildly. "The pigs, the infamous swine," he was saying. "Shall it come to pass that they will escape punishment? Is it possible that the German population will not suffer any of the hardships that their soldiers and officers have inflicted upon us? Shall they not salute our officers, descend into the gutters as our soldiers promenade on their sidewalks? Is it conceivable that their women will be spared the humiliation of humbly begging of our officers a passport to travel between Aix-la-Chapelle and Cologne as our wives and daughters had to do to go from Bruges to Ostend? If we end it now they are beaten militarily but they are not vanquished in their pride, in their hearts?"

"He is a hotel keeper. The Germans requisitioned twenty-seven thousand bottles of wine from his cellar," volunteered one of his audience standing near by. Of all the Allied soldiers the Belgian was the one who appeared to have the greatest desire to enter Germany. His country is strewn with the wreckage of former happy homes, perhaps the very one where the soldier dwelt is now a heap of ruins. But these soldier boys display no hatred. They have not been robbed of their cheese or their wine. They have merely risked their lives in rain filled trenches and bullet swept fields for the past four years.
