WAR MAKERS NOW HATED BY HUNS

BERLIN, Dec. 21.—(Delayed)—German peace delegates, it appears will object to any penalty for the kaiser which would make him a national hero. They don't want "a return from Elba."

All the war makers are now unpopular in Germany, with the exception of Field Marshal von Hindenburg. General Ludendorff is the worst hated. The militarists are blamed for the present situation, but the general feeling today appears to be "let bygones be bygones."

Sentiment is very bitter toward the kaiser and crown prince, as institutions, but there is little personal feeling against them. Many people seem to feel that the loss of their thrones was sufficient punishment.

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Bulgarians Glad Allies Reach Constantinople

SOFIA, Bulgaria. (Correspondence of the Associated Press) Bulgarian political leaders profess to be gratified by the entrance of the Entente fleet into Constantinople and express the belief that it assures an equitable and reasonable solution of the interminable question of who shall control the Straits of the Bosphorus. This problem has been the constant nightmare of most of the Balkan states, particularly of Bulgaria, Rumania and Greece. These countries always have considered the possibility of Russian occupation of Constantinople to be a serious menace to their own national existence. This fear was one of the causes which led Bulgaria to take sides with the Central Powers in the war. Later when Russia abandoned her exclusive claim to Constantinople, Rumania's entry into the war on the side of the Entente was facilitated.

Political circles in Bulgaria are profoundly impressed by the giddy rapidity with which events of far-reaching international importance now are transpiring. The folly of the policy pursued by the former King Ferdinand and his government in Bulgaria has been brought home

to have been carried above their normal condition.

Dr. Girska said that his people feel that they must perish, but they wish to fulfill their duty to the last. They have quite given up hope of effective military aid, but they are determined to fight to the last breath. He expresses the opinion that the Russian nation would surprise the world by its powerful development in the future. He added:

"We Czech-Slovaks understand the Russian people. We have lived among them during all the great changes of the war. We must not forget that a great majority of the Russian people have not said their last word."

"In giving to the Russian army protection, we had absolutely no aspiration for political power in Russia, but such a misunderstanding seems to have been our fate from the very beginning of the war. Even now we are called by the Russians 'the mysterious Czech-Slovaks.'"

Dr. Girska said it was a fatal mistake to suppose bolshevism to be a democratic movement. Democracy endeavors to organize and rule the people according to human conscience; but the bolshevik stamp out the principles of morality and culture. Bolshevism was a collective title used for different political and social phenomena; from the idealistic Utopia to the criminal and German propaganda forces.

The Red Cross has sent 2,375 women workers and 2,921 men workers to France for specialized work. Most of them are volunteers, but highly skilled.
