

Life of Allied Leaders Simple

CHAUMONT, HAUTE MARNE, FRANCE. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—When he is here at General Headquarters General Pershing leads a very busy but very simple life. There is little ceremony of an ostentatious kind either at his chateau or around his offices. There is nothing to distinguish his office rooms in "A" building of the headquarters group from those of any other officer. One orderly sits at his door, there is no sentry and the visitor walks unannounced into the adjoining reception room to be received by one of his staff.

General Pershing's trips to and from his chateau in the country are made in his motor car, distinguished only by its red four starred insignia on the windshield and where would be the number plate, which slips in and out of the car and is carried on the back of the driver's coat. Ordinarily he is accompanied only by his personal aide, his staff following at a distance great enough not to mark the big cars as one squadron.

In fine weather he sometimes walks the two or three miles from the outskirts of Chaumont to his country home, and that, with quiet horseback rides thru the beautiful country hereabouts, gave him his needed exercise.

Much of his time since last Spring when the American forces began real participation in strength in the fighting has been spent at Advanced Army Headquarters. These have been at various places, sometimes at a distance to entail long, hard automobile rides from them to Chaumont when circumstances demanded his presence here. Often after a hard day at Advanced Headquarters the General has made the three or four-hour drive late at night, only to depart early the next day. His powerful closed car with double rear wheels usually travels at high speed and in its comfortable cushions he obtains the rest denied him in bed.

Life at General Pershing's chateau is plain to the point of simplicity. Except for the beautiful old castle and its picturesque setting in the Valley of the Marne, it might be the home life of any fairly well-to-do American business man. Only uniformity of his military household set it apart. His personal staff lives with him and his servants are negro soldiers detailed. And they are good cooks as his few guests can testify placing on his table simple, well cooked American dishes, usually three or at most four courses including coffee and cheese and served in an American style.

No sentries are in evidence nothing to mark the Chateau as the residence of the Commander in Chief. The visitor's car drives thru a plain unguarded gateway in a closely set grove, along a curving roadway for a few hundred yards and then only is had the first glimpse of the old castle lying in its parks and lawns bordered

by one side by a dense evergreen forest of the Marne. The visitor's car will find a square paved parking place, an added mark of formality in the simple, plain French chateau.

When General Pershing himself comes from a visit on the Marne to his headquarters, he is usually accompanied by his personal aide, his staff following at a distance great enough not to mark the big cars as one squadron.

General Pershing has kept himself in splendid physical condition during these trying months. He is as broad and stocky as he was when he came from the Mexican campaign, his strength and endurance in the campaigns when he first saw action. His eyes still sparkle when he looks into the faces of his men, and he still has the same keen, quick, incisive smile.

For those he has known in past days he always has some mental reminiscence to recall some incident of the campaign in Mexico or in World War I and his hearty laugh often sounds thru the doors of his office as he chats with some old acquaintance.

PREVENTION RULES FOR INFLUENZA

If you feel sick and believe you have "Spanish" influenza, go to bed and send for the doctor. This is important.

All that has been said above about "Spanish" influenza is true also of tuberculosis. Do your part to keep them away.

DEATH NOTICE FOR WILLIAM BY BELGIANS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 29.—Belgium has proclaimed the "death" of the former German Kaiser. Satire has been called into play by the citizens of the village ground under the Prussian flag for more than four years in a black-bordered funeral notice for William Hohenzollern, recently issued. A copy has been received here by Charles Winsell, Belgian Vice Consul, who's brother was a "bookkeeper" of Ghent.

The "death notice" printed with a large black border, reads, translated from the French as follows: "The very noble, greatly abused, but indomitable Madame Belgium and her brave children—Albert, the invincible; Elizabeth, heroine; Leopold, the intruder; Charles, the valiant; Marie-Jose, the gracious—these are the King and Queen of Belgium and their children, the loyalist—Belgian family and their parents, Wallons, the true, have the immense joy of announcing the death of their father and tyrant—the despicable murderer, thief, felon and assassin who died from indigestion caused by his many robberies and burglaries committed with the help of shameful lies and after a reign of four years of erizandage. He was smothered by his own crimes, to the great relief of humanity.

Thanksgiving services will be held in the open air the day of his burial in the public sewer. The following animals will be slaughtered at the altar of peace:

"Guillot, (Title of reproach for William) his son, Fritz, robber of olive to houses, Admiral von Kfisch, (son of Fritz) the never fighter Krupp the manufacturer.

"Remember him in your curses. Funeral services will be held at the undertaker, Altes Brothers, Rue Alais-Lorraine, No 169 Milliards.

"The streets where the funeral will pass will be disinfected with Yeer Water."

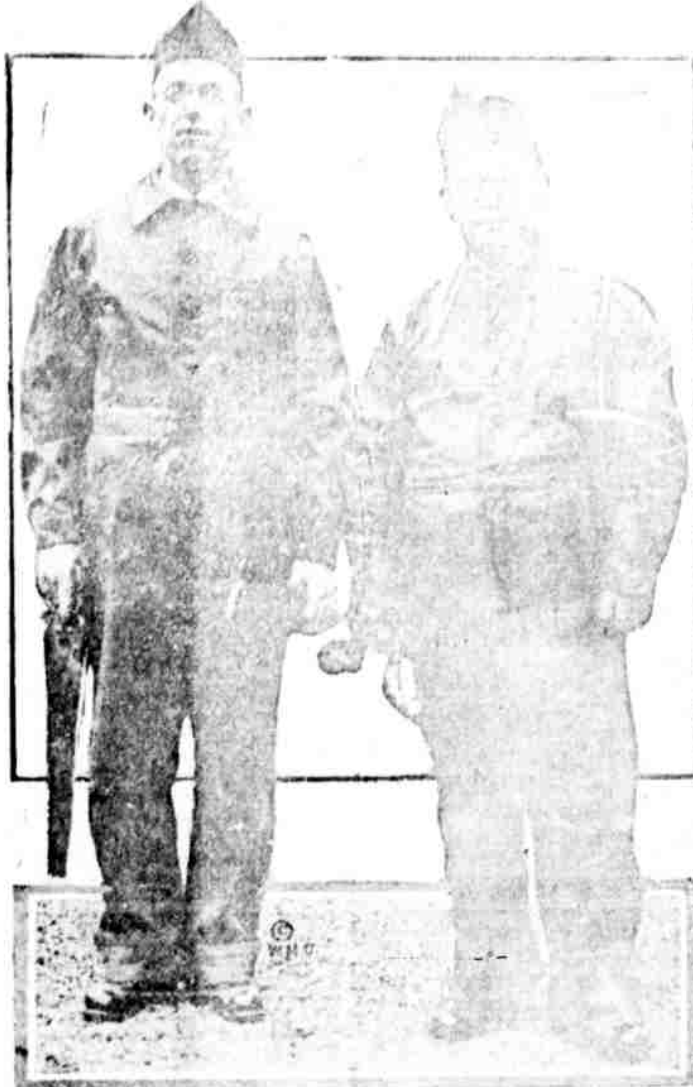

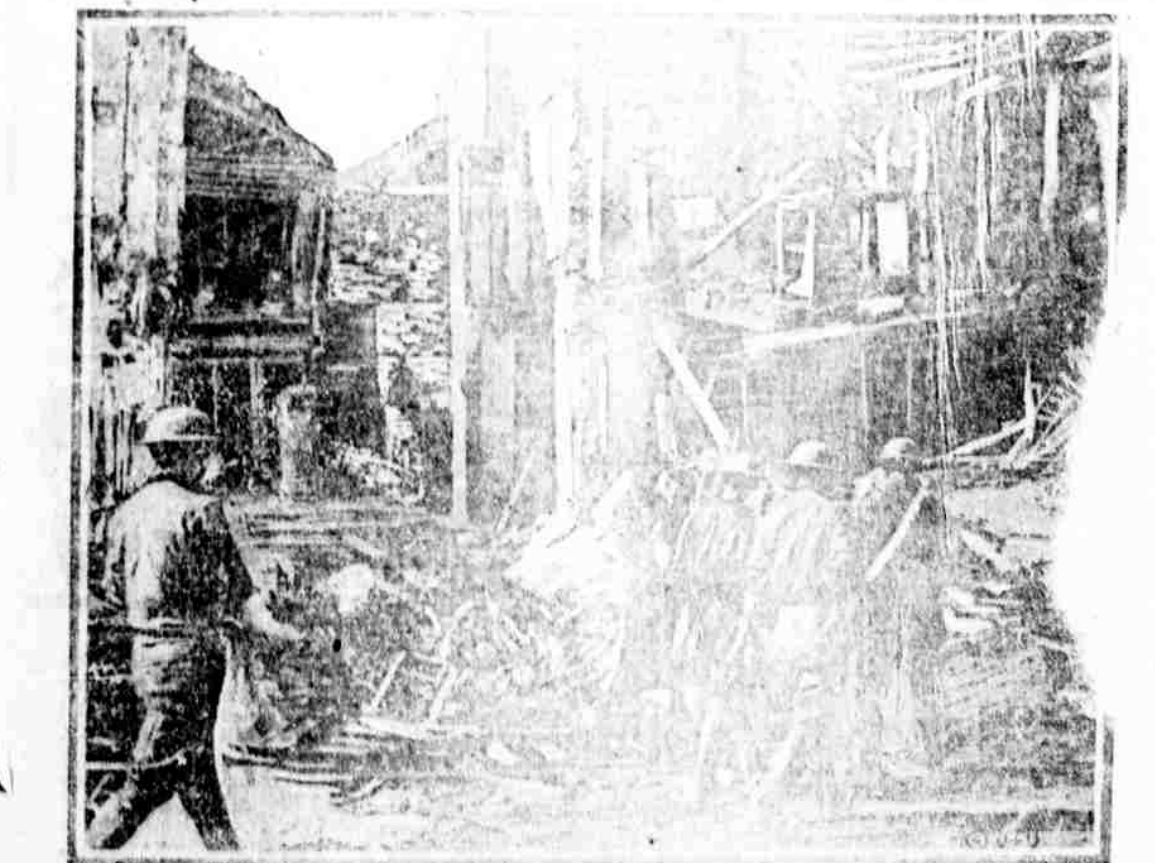
