RELIGION IS
PROBLEM OF
JUGO-SLAVSOther Grave Questions to
Be Considered

DISCUSSIONS BY PRESS

Austrian Press Takes Up Industrial Problems, Jugo-Slav Papers Discuss Political Developments, and German Newspapers Pay Strict Attention to German Economic and Industrial Interests

ZURICH, Jan. 2.—The Austrian press, which has given only a few lines to the occupation of Trieste and Pola, gives extensive space to the industrial problem of Austria. The Jugo-Slav newspapers, on the other hand, follow political developments closely, and the religious complications which appear on the horizon. For the Croats are Catholics, and the entrance of the Serbs, who are of the Orthodox Greek faith in Bosnia, brings the religious question to the front and it does not give promise of the happiest results in the solution of the intricate Jugo-Slav problem.

Meanwhile the German newspapers discuss little besides German interests, especially economic and industrial interests. From long articles in the Zeit, the Neue Freie Presse and the Fremdenblatt it is inferred that the two most important questions of the future in German-Austria are of political and economic character. They are political in regard to the uncertainty which exists over the fate of the great mineral districts of Bohemia which the Germans claim, and which the Czechoslovaks justly consider an integral part of their state. They are economic in regard to the lack of employment to follow the cessation of war material production.

In an article entitled "The Economic Reactions of the War," the Zeit and other newspapers conclude in a rather optimistic tone demonstrating that the industry of German-Austria ought to be a gainer by the war from a technical point of view, and that it represents the only basis for economical reconstruction. A meeting of the war industries informed the national German-Austrian council that the work of their shops would continue for the requirements of peace, and that they can also offer work plenty to the workmen returning from the front in order that the grave problem of food supply may be adjusted.

At the Theaters

The attraction at the Star Sunday and Monday will be the second United States Official War picture, "America's Answer" presented by the Division of Films, Committee on Public Information, George Creel, chairman, and distributed by the World Film Corporation.

This great war picture was taken by the U. S. Signal Corps, A. E. F., by order of General John J. Pershing, under the direction of the General Staff. It shows the activities of the first half million American soldiers in France.

Besides the military phases of the picture, there is shown in detail the vast amount of work accomplished by the Engineers' Corps. The building of miles of concrete docks, the erection of huge railroad shops, the laying of nine hundred miles of rail and the mushroom-like springing up of miles of hospitals and refrigerating, storage and reclamation plants.

To those who have gladly given their work and their money to the winning of the war "America's Answer" will be an inspiration for new sacrifice, effort and giving.

SALVAGE DEPARTMENT
SAVES VAST AMOUNT.

TOURS, FRANCE, Jan. 2.—The American Expeditionary salvage department has saved during the past six months over \$3,500,000 worth of war material by recovering, repairing and collecting the previously rejected equipment of the soldiers, according to officers of the Quartermasters' Department here.

Communication In Army
Is Immense ProblemHEADQUARTERS, AMERICAN
EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, FRANCE.

(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—In an army the size of this, scattered throughout the length and breadth of France from the saconet to the Swiss border, the problem of communication is second only to that of equal importance to that of supplies.

When the American forces came to France it was one of the first efforts to which American ingenuity and invention was directed and the Signal Corps, under which communications of the American Expeditionary Force, existing French, telegraph and telephone systems were overburdened. There was little left for us and Brigadier General S. Russell, chief signal officer, and his staff of experts tackled the job.

What they have done in construction is shown in some statistics furnished to the Associated Press. The Signal Corps has built approximately 1,750 miles of poles on which it has strung 4,175 miles of wire. In addition about 2,000 miles of American wire has been strung on existing systems for our use and it has leased and operates more than 3,000 miles of French wire. Exchange lines to the extent of 12,750 miles have been built and to operate these lines it has 244 telephone offices, 7,995 telephone stations and 102 telegraph offices.

All thru France, from the base ports to the front lines occupied by the American forces, thruout our training areas, in fact nearly everywhere, the shining copper wires on American cross bar poles, so different from the European system, are a new feature of the landscape and frequently one heard newly arrived American soldiers exclaim "That's American." On main line systems with many wires the French customarily use two poles side by side and the wires are strung on cross bars between, and others on single insulators.

JAP MOUNTAIN PARTY
IS FROZEN TO DEATH.

SENDAI, Japan, Jan. 2.—A party of nine Japanese students and teachers who went mountain climbing on a nearby range lost their way in a snow-storm and were frozen to death. Searchers found the bodies huddled together in a ravine, the arms entwined in a vain effort to keep off the cold.
