HELENA, Mont., Jan. 3.—When the peace conference opens and President Wilson, or David Lloyd George, or Premier Clemenceau, or the Account of Sweet or the grand vizier of them, desires to call somebody about something on the house telephone in the palace of Versailles he or they will have to be very polite to a pretty girl from Helena, Montana, U. S. A.

For the head central at the Versailles place, during the conference will be Miss Merle Egan of this city. Miss Egan volunteered early as an exchange expert. She was a telephone girl here. Her knowledge of French stood her in good stead and she has been for some weeks in the central headquarters in Paris, attending to the calls of the peace conference. Word now comes that she has been appointed chief operator at Versailles during the meeting.

Miss Egan was not only one of the nicest girls in Helena but was known to newspapermen as one of the cleverest, for she backed the press in more than one crisis when the telephone was the only hope. She had been promoted and was in the divisional office of the telephone company when she enlisted, and she took her own corps of "Hello girls" to Paris.

ALLIES HAVE DIVIDED THE HUN U-BOATS

LONDON, Jan. 1.—The surrender of German submarines are being divided between the Allies, according to the Evening Mail, which says that fifteen have been apportioned to France, ten to Italy, seven to Japan and four to the United States.

The latter are said to be on the way to the United States now. How the remaining hundred and twenty seven of the U-boats will be allotted has not yet been intimated.

POPE TO HAVE NO ENVOYS AT PEACE MEETING

By the Italian-American News Bureau LONDON, Jan. 3.—Mgr. Caretti under-secretary of state at the Vatican and special envoy to London to await the arrival of President Wilson and hold a conference with him granted an interview in regard to whether the Pope will have a voice in the peace conference, and on the Roman question.

"I can authorize you to deny," he said, "that the Pope wishes to send a representative to the peace conference. They are repeating today what was repeated to satisfy years ago and has been always categorically denied. You may be convinced that the Holy See till now has not done anything to solicit an invitation, and take part in the peace conference because there was no occasion for it!"

The correspondent, understood from the last words that he meant to refer to the peace programme of President Wilson which is based on practically the same as Pope Benedict

XV, expressed in his famous peace note.

In regard to the Roman question, Mgr. Caretti denied the report that a strip of territory reaching from Rome to the sea would be granted in order to permit the pontiff to travel without touching Italian territory. He said the Vatican wanted to see the Roman question solved, and that the steps taken led to the hope for a happy solution. He hopes for much from the conference he will hold with President Wilson when he will explain the Pope's views about peace and the settlement of the Roman question.

He was especially vindictive in his criticism of the Adjutant General's office.
