

Ireland Confident of Independent Future

The following special cable from London to the Portland Oregonian, gives a clear idea of the present attitude of the Sinn Fein party on the Irish question:

"Ireland having voted herself out of the British Parliament," says a Dublin dispatch to the Daily News, "has an air of quietness, confidence and self-satisfaction that is slightly embarrassing to an English visitor. Interest centers in the decisions that are being taken at the extraordinary shabby and mean-looking headquarters in Harcourt street of all-powerful Sinn Fein Republicans."

"We have to reckon simply with plans for establishing an independent Irish republic. The first step is, I understand, to be the summoning of a national council, the nucleus of which will be the 73 duly elected Sinn Fein M. P.'s or as many of them as the government sees fit to release from prison or internment."

"The number of Irish M. P.'s, who are either under lock and key or wanted by the police appears to be a little over 30, so that in any case 40 members will be available. An invitation which, of course, will be declined is also to be extended to the Unionist and Nationalist parties."

"The Irish labor party will be invited to send representatives and almost certainly will agree to do so, as its complexion is mainly republican while there is also likely to be a small attendance of bishops and nobles."

MILITARY DRILL FOR STATE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 11.—Colonel John Leader, former commanding officer of the Oregon state office training camp at the university, will spend most of the time during January and February supervising the military training in the high schools of the state which desire the work.

Beginning with the first of February the Colonel will go to Blue Grove and then to Pendleton, Baker, Ontario, Albany, Lebanon and Salem.

NEW AIR LAWS MUST BE MADE FOR COMMERCE

LONDON, (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—There will be no resumption of commercial airplane service from England to any other country until complete plans are formulated for regulating and controlling air traffic, says an official of the British Air Ministry. That will be a task, he said, fraught with enormous difficulties.

"To begin with," he pointed out, "there are no laws of the air at present, and to bring the air into the commercial sphere without laws would produce chaos. There would be immediate trouble with the customs authorities of all nations. Adequate legislation will have to be framed to prevent contraband merchandise being carried thru the air from one country to another."

"There will have to be a system of air customs, and that in itself presents many problems. Then, again, the unauthorized carrying of letters would bring in the postal authorities."

"To police the air presents other difficulties. Try to imagine an offender swooping away from an air problem, whose machine may be the slower of the two, and sliding behind a cloud until everything was clear."

"It's a new world, and we've got to make proper arrangements for it." At present, navigation of aircraft of every description in the United Kingdom and the coasts and territorial waters adjoining is prohibited by law, with the exception of naval and military machines, or airplanes operating within three miles of a recognized aerodrome. That law, the official said, is likely to stand until the Air Ministry can map out a comprehensive scheme of air legislation.

The 150 hens in the electrified pen produced, during 12 months, 442 eggs. The same number of hens in the lighted pen produced 1,396 eggs, a gain of 72 dozen. Hens in the lighted pen consumed a little more food than their less active neighbors. The net gain was 28 cents per hen in egg production for the "electric" hens.

"I cannot say yet," said Professor Schoppe, "what effect this forced production will have on the hatching quality of eggs and upon the vitality of birds as those are problems that will require further investigation."

The above method of increasing egg production has been practiced for the past two years by F. W. Riggs of this city, who has satisfied himself beyond doubt of its superiority. While he has less than three dozen laying hens, Mr. Riggs has been getting as high as two dozen eggs per day all this winter. His lowest production during the past cold snap was fifteen eggs.

SENATOR WOULD TAKE PART OF MEXICAN LAND

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Speaking in the Senate in support of his resolution of acquisition by the United States thru negotiation with Mexico of Lower California and part of the state of Sonora, Senator Ashurst of Arizona, declared the Mexican government was unable to control the territory or protect it from foreign invasion. Annexed to the United States he said, it could be converted into immense agricultural value by irrigation from the Colorado River.

Lower California, said the Senator, is the "vermiform appendix of Mexico and the Achilles heel of the United States."

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 11.—The proposal made in the United States Senate by Senator Ashurst that the United States purchase Lower California and part of Sonora has created considerable comment in the Mexican press.

El Universal, long a leading proponent of the proposal, today attacks the proposal. It asserts that Mexico places the promises of President Wilson that small nations will be protected ahead of the menace to Mexico implied in the Ashurst plan.
