CHICKEN FARMING

PAYS AT CORVALLIS.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 11.—Six hundred ninety-five eggs a day from 1100 pullets, and a daily profit of nearly \$28 is the record of J. H. Hanson of the College View Poultry farm in Benton county. Mr. Hanson obtains his breeding males from the College each year. His success is attributed by James Dryden, professor of poultry husbandry, to a combination of good breeding stock and good management.

WILLIAM'S DAD MENTALLY WEAK DECLARED SON

BERLIN. (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Less than two years before William II, the former German Emperor, came to the throne of Germany, his father Frederick considered it dangerous to allow him to have any hand in the foreign politics of the German Empire. Frederick, in fact had an extremely low regard for his son's mental equipment and ability, and it is frankly set forth in a letter written to Bismarck, September 28, 1886 from Portofino, Italy and which has just been made public.

William's principal defects at that time, as his father saw them, were "his habit of making snap judgments in a manner tending to exaggeration," lack of "actual learning" which was "still full of gaps," and "an inclination to conceit." Here is the text of the letter:

"My son, Prince Wilhelm has without my previous knowledge expressed the wish to His Majesty (William I, Frederick then was still the Crown Prince) to become better acquainted with the operations of our ministries during the coming winter, and I learn that it is intended to employ him in the Foreign Office.

"Inasmuch as I have received no official communication to that effect, I am compelled to turn to you in confidence to learn what has really been decided on, and further to declare that, despite the fact that I am in favor in principle of introducing my son into questions of the higher administration, I am decidedly opposed to having him begin at the Foreign Office. For in view of the importance of the tasks to be entrusted to the prince, I consider it imperative that he shall first of all thoroughly learn the internal conditions of his own land and have the feeling that he understands them thoroughly before he, with his habit of making snap judgments tending to exaggeration, busies himself with policies.

"His actual learning is still full of gaps, and at the same time he lacks the proper foundation, and for this reason it is absolutely necessary that his education be improved and completed. If he could be assigned to the office of a civilian advisory official and if he could later be connected with or even given a post in one of the administrative ministries it would serve this purpose. But, in view of the immaturity as well as of the inexperience of my eldest son, and also of his inclination to conceit, I am compelled to declare that it is absolutely dangerous to bring him into touch with questions of foreign policy at this time. And while begging you to consider my communication as strongly confidential, I count on your support in this matter, which causes me grave anxiety."

Important Irrigation Legislation Pending

SALEM, Jan. 11.—Irrigation legislation will be an important feature of the legislative session which will open next Monday, in the opinion of State Engineer Percy A. Cupper.

He declared there would be important legislation along the line of making preparation for co-operating with the government in the development of farm homes for returning soldiers. This will not include provision for financing any portion of the development program, as he looks to the federal government to do that, but it will pertain to making Carey Act land and land in other irrigation projects available for the government's program.

Mr. Cupper does not take the view, expressed quite frequently of late, that very few of Oregon's returning soldiers will care to go onto farms. He points out that the fact that the government is seeking to reward them for the services they have rendered their country of offering them a chance to own a well developed farm on easier terms than any other citizen could obtain, will appeal to them.

"It will appeal to that trait in human nature which likes to get something for nothing," he said. "Not that these boys are getting something for nothing, as they have earned all that they will get, but the government's program will appeal in that way to a substantial percentage of the returning soldiers."

NEW COUNTY COURT HAS FIRST MEETING

FIVE PACKERS CONTROL BIG CITY STOCKYARDS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Stockyards in 33 cities are controlled by the five big packers, sixteen jointly by two or more of the packers and seventeen by one of them. Chairman Colver of the federal trade commission said today in continuing his testimony before the house interstate commerce committee on the administration bill for regulating the packing industry.

Under the irrigation code passed by the last legislature, private capital has become interested in irrigation district securities until in the last two days more than \$2,000,000 of irrigation bonds have been sold, and the money is now being spent on irrigation projects. Mr. Cupper says that the irrigation business has been put on a safe footing in this state, and that Oregon is in position to meet the government in any program it puts forward for land development.
