## Trip Hammer Used For Spy Signals

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 14.—An interesting story of enemy spy work is told by Frank H. Gaskill, assistant chief of the Protective League, which rendered service during the war.

The organization, Mr. Gaskill relates, was responsible for the intercepting of a man caught spelling out dangerous messages with a trip hammer he was operating in a big industrial plant on the Delaware River. The messages were first detected by a telegraph operator in Palmyra, N. J. He caught the hammer spelling out:

"Troop ship moving tomorrow morning."

The telegrapher notified the gov-

ernment authorities who, caught the trip-hammer operator signalling, "Raid on fishing fleet complete surprise."

This was several hours before the news dispatches brought word of the sinking of a fishing fleet by German submarines off New England. The trip-hammer expert was found to be a former telegraph operator. Mr. Gaskill said the mystery of where the operator got his news or to whom he was signalling was never solved.

## The Coffee Situation Today

Some months ago, for want of tonnage, the Food Administration notified the coffee roasters that they could not import more than ninety days' supply of coffee at a time. When the stocks of coffee in the hands of the roasters reached this point, the Government placed an embargo on the importation of coffee of more than thirty days' supply.

The Brazilian government, that controls 70 per cent of the world's supply said: "If you will not let us ship our coffee to the United States when you do want our coffee you will PAY our price for it." Now every month, when the coffee roaster sends in his order for green coffee for the month's supply, the Brazilian government says, "this coffee will cost you so much more this month than last month."

The coffee grower is making millions of dollars, and the people of the United States (the largest consumers of coffee in the world) must pay.

## MAY WITHDRAW THE YANKS FROM RUSSIA

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 14.—A Resolution to place the Senate on record as favoring the withdrawal of the American soldiers from Russia "as soon as practicable" was introduced by Senator Johnson, of California yesterday, with the assertion that the United States has no Russian policy and was inviting disaster.

## YANKS DEMOBILIZING AT TWICE BRITISH RATE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 13.—General March said today that the demobilization of the army here is proceeding twice as fast as in England. Six hundred and ninety-three thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine have been discharged he said, compared to 352,658 of the British. March said the American troops now scheduled for demobilization number 1,951,000 including 96,000 which have actually been returned from overseas.
