QUAKE SENTINEL STARTS LIFE JOB

SAN BERNADINO, Cal., Jan. 14.—To act as a sentinel in warning the people of the United States of earthquakes, which he says he can detect the day before they occur, Oris Kennedy, a lawyer and scientist of this city has given up his practice and will soon leave for a point on what is known as San Andreas fault, in the Cajon Pass near here.

Mr. Kennedy will spend the remainder of his life in studying this fault, he says. The San Andreas fault runs from a point in Golden Gate Park, San Francisco, to the Imperial Valley, he declares.

The Lawyer-scientist claims to have predicted on April 13, the earthquake which destroyed the towns of Hemet and San Jacinto April 21st last.

YANKS LEAVE ENGLAND WITH JINGLING POCKETS.

LIVERPOOL, Eng., Jan. 14.—American soldiers ordered home since the signing of the armistice are not leaving England without funds. Most of them have some money, and some of them have considerable amounts. One Red Cross officer who has been here from London changing the money of the soldiers from pounds to dollars, in order that they may have the currency of their own money when they reach America, says: "I have changed the money of some thousands of men and not one of them had less than two months pay to take home with him. Some of them had as much as \$100 while here and there was an especially thrifty fellow with \$125. When it is remembered that the boys have been subjected to the temptations of buying conveniences for the home folks in a strange country and that they have been paying war prices for all they bought, it can be seen they have done very well."

The County Court is holding an adjourned meeting at the Court House this afternoon.

NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that the health board has decreed as follows: That all churches, schools, theaters and dances shall be closed, and all assemblies discontinued; that no games of pool or cards shall be played in any public places between the hours of 6 o'clock Wednesday morning, January 15th, and 6 o'clock Monday morning, January 20th, that all of these places shall be cleaned and disinfected according to the rules of the Health Board.

That all stores and places of business, except drug stores and restaurants, shall be closed during the afternoons of Wednesday, January 15, and Thursday, January 16, and these places shall be cleaned and disinfected according to the rules of the Health Board.

That all premises, places of business, outbuildings, and any spots that may be harboring places for breeding of disease shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected under the rules of the Health Board.

That a rigid quarantine shall be established over the homes where cases of contagious or infectious diseases may exist and anyone violating this quarantine shall be punished to the full extent of the law. It is the desire of the Health Board to appeal to the sense of honor of those quarantined, but where this appeal is ignored, then we shall enforce the regulations in all their severity.

The names and addresses of persons who shall be reported to the Health Board as having contagious or infectious diseases shall be published daily in The Evening Herald, this publication being for the purpose of giving notice that quarantine has been established as to these persons, so that the public may co-operate with the Health Board in seeing that the quarantine is not broken. Where such infraction is discovered it should be immediately reported to the headquarters of the board at the isolation hospital, when prompt action shall be taken by us.
