MORE MISREPRESENTATION

"Lumbermen in touch with the situation report that the huge mill which was expected to be installed here in the near future by the Long Bell Lumber company, of Kansas City, which recently took over the 87,000-acre tract of timber on the Klamath Indian reservation, may be built on the shore of Goose Lake in Lake County, 150 miles east, owing to the alleged discrimination of the present Klamath County officers against the timber interests. This mill, when built, will probably be larger than all the present operations in Klamath County combined."

We would like to know who was the author of the above article. It was evidently published in a trade journal of some sort—possibly the Lumberman. The journal, of course, is not to blame, for it has to depend upon its correspondent for its information, and presumed that its source is one of reliability and entirely neutral. In this instance, however, the journal is made the victim of a willful attempt to use its columns in the furtherance of a campaign that has been under way for some time to destroy the credit of this county, and to bring about a virtual reign of terror, in a financial way, in the hopes that the selfish purposes of certain individuals may be served. The Herald has been contemplating the taking up of this question, and will do so at the proper time, but it refers to it now in the hopes that any injury that may have been done by the article quoted above may be rectified, and the facts brought to the attention of the public. The article referred to was clipped from the paper in which it appeared, pasted on a piece of paper, enclosed in an envelope without comment or memorandum of any kind, and sent to a resident of this city thru the mails.

The Long Bell people are not going to place their mill on the shores of Goose Lake and have given such a proposition no consideration whatever. The facts are that this concern, which is one of the big lumber manufacturing companies of the United States, had an opportunity to buy the Booth-Kelly tract at a figure that would prove to be a good buy, and they took advantage of it. They have no plans for its development in the immediate future, and when they decide to open it up and erect a mill, Klamath Falls will stand just at good a chance of getting that mill as any other point in this territory. The Herald believes that it will stand a better chance, for this city is going out after all the mills it can get, and it is going to get them, and among those that will come here will be the one contemplated by the Long Bell people.

But such articles as the one here referred to only make the accomplishment of this task all the harder. Whoever wrote that article has a good deal to answer for, not only for the betrayal of the confidence of the publisher of the journal in which it appeared, but for the injury it has done this community, and if these lines come before his eyes, The Herald hopes he will be honest enough with all parties concerned to make the proper correction thru the same columns in which he published his falsehood.

As to the alleged discrimination of the timber interests by the officers of this county, that is likewise untrue. This is a question to which there are two sides. There has for a number of years been considerable friction over the question of taxation. The large timber interests have sought to force their side of the question to a settlement along lines laid down by them, and in order to promote this plan have attacked the financial credit of the county in various suits, chief of which is enjoining the payment of warrants that have been issued above the legal limit.

Since the restraining order was issued, we understand that there has been a system of discounting carried on, whereby warrants were re-

leased from the injunction and paid, provided the holders thereof would discount them anywhere from 5 per cent to 35 per cent. To this policy The Herald takes very serious and vigorous exception. These warrants are either worth 100 cents on the dollar, or they are not worth anything. The belief of The Herald is that every warrant that has been issued should be paid at its full face value, for back of it stands the honor of the county. No argument can be advanced that will convince any honest man that they should be discounted, and the opinion of a crook should not be considered in the settlement of such a moral question.

The Herald does not believe that the county officials have any desire to be unfair to the timber interests, great or small. If we thought they were, we would be as strongly opposed to such an attitude as we are to the effort to rob the innocent holders of our county warrants. If this paper can be shown wherein an injustice has been done the timber people, it will join with them, heart and soul, in correcting it; but if we are convinced that no injustice has been done, then we shall look to them to join hands with the people of Klamath in the rehabilitation of the county's credit, and in the full and economical development of its resources. The Herald at a later date is going to take up this question, and in the meantime will be glad to have placed at its disposal such information as will enable it to reach a fair and intelligent conclusion. And in this we hope to have the cordial co-operation of the timber owners of the county.

BIG MOVE ON TO SELL BABY BONDS

PORTLAND, Jan. 15.—The thrift campaign among school children of the state, first honors having been won by Jackson County in 1918, as just announced, will be pushed with even more vigor this year by the Oregon Bankers' Association, state department of education and Oregon Agricultural College, thru the boys' and girls' club work department.

Thousands of children were interested thru the campaign last year, and began habits of thrift. The work proved so successful that the Oregon Bankers' Association will not only again offer \$50 in cash for the county making the best record, but will spend \$200 in printing pupils' record books.

The Teachers' Association will publish a report of the work accomplished in the last year, and plans for future work. In Jackson County 1,922 school children saved and deposited in banks and postoffices at least 10 cents a week each during the year.

CUTTING MILK-DELIVERY COSTS.

Investigating the system of handling dairy products in Hampton County, Mass., the farm bureau found it uneconomical because of the time consumed in the delivery of milk. The assistance of the Bureau of Markets of the United States Department of Agriculture was secured and a survey was made. It was learned in

town of Westfield, where 13 dealers travel 190 miles to deliver 4,630 quarts of milk, that the establishment of a central milk plant would save the dairying of that community more than \$30,000 annually. A similar survey was conducted in the town of Springfield, and plans are being developed for the erection of co-operative milk plants in both towns.
