Big Spruce Equipment To Be Auctioned Off

TEN MILLION DOLLAR EQUIPMENT, SOME OF WHICH HAS NEVER BEEN USED, IS TO BE DISPOSED OF SOON—SUDDEN TERMINATION OF WAR RENDERS IT USELESS TO GOVERNMENT

PORTLAND, Jan. 20.—Probably the only organization in the United States, private or public, which has ever developed from nothing, to its present status is the United States Spruce Production Corporation, which, within little more than a year was built up to a concern with equipment valued at \$10,000,000.

With Portland as his headquarters Brigadier-General Bruce P. Disque, its commanding officer, and his staff developed the corporation into one of the most remarkable arms of defense in the whole war machine. In addition to its material equipment, the organization controlled more than 130,000 men.

And now that the war is over, this big organization's work is finished, so far as spruce production is concerned, and the corporation will soon dissolve as romantically as it came into existence when it was created for a specific purpose and began its remarkable career.

All of the equipment, consisting of everything necessary to the operation of a logging camp, railroad, or saw mill, is to be sold. Bids are being received at headquarters in the Yeon building, Portland, and will be received up to and including February 15.

Material and equipment, much of it never having been used because of the sudden termination of the war, is in storage at the corporation's big cut-up mill in Vancouver, Wash., and may be inspected by those interested upon proper certification from the headquarters office.

Indications point to lively bidding on the equipment, as already numbers of proposals have been received at headquarters. It is regarded by those in authority as a very opportune time to dispose of the compon-

ent parts of the big war machine, owing to the fact that large things are expected to be undertaken soon in a reconstruction way throughout the country.

With the whole world in line for bidding, it is anticipated that the opening of proposals will reveal enormous interest in this, the largest sale ever put on by Uncle Sam.

In the conduct of the Spruce Production Corporation nothing was neglected that would add efficiency to the undertaking. All of the equipment for the operations thruout the entire Northwest was of the best type and all construction work was done in the most thorough manner to accomplish the end in view and is all applicable to commercial uses.

Because of this and the further fact that at all times the commanding officer insisted upon the best of care being taken of all the material and equipment, it is now in splendid condition.

As may easily be surmised, the work of preparing for a sale of this kind entails endless, detailed and painstaking labor. Various boards, trained for the purpose by General Disque, have been engaged for some time in arranging it into catalogued form and checking up on every angle of the corporation's extensive properties preparatory to the final disposal.

It was little realized by the general public during the war that such a gigantic machine had been built up. Modern mills were constructed, the latest pattern machinery installed; railroads were built into the forests; the biggest kind of things were done and all within a very few months.

The sale by sealed bids decided upon by General Disque and his staff was adopted as the best means of

returning to the people of this country the large sums which had been invested thru this Government agency for necessary war equipment and which is now no longer required for that purpose.

And so, as it came into being methodically, systematically, the United States Spruce Corporation will, as soon as possible be dissolved. Thus will be closed one of the most picturesque chapters in the entire world war.

"Pa" Philip, Who Helped Transport 110,000 Troops

After having dodged a dozen U-boats' torpedoes, Chief Engineer Arthur E. Philip of the Empress of Britain has the record of having helped to transport 110,000 troops while traveling 174,000 miles. This took him to every part of the world during his more than four years of war service. Philip, who was personally decorated by King George, is senior chief engineer of the Southern Pacific fleet. He is known by his fellow officers at "Pa." The Empress of Britain has been bringing wounded soldiers back to the United States.

Mammoth Navy Yard Now at Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 20.—The Philadelphia navy yard has been greatly expanded during the war.

Nearly \$20,000,000 has been appropriated for the task of making the yard an ideal establishment for warship purposes. The building of the enormous drydock, 1,064 feet long and 210 feet wide, will absorb \$5,000,000 of this sum. It will accommodate the largest ship afloat, and will be so constructed as to accommodate two ships at one time.

Two new ways, 900 feet long, for building battleships, a large structural machine shop and pattern and machine shops will cost another \$3,000,000. It is expected that within a few months the first two battle cruisers of the new navy will be under construction on the new ways.

Since the war began the naval aircraft building has been completed at a cost of \$5,000,000, and when the armistice was declared airplanes from this factory said to equal the largest and most powerful in the world, were being turned out.

There are at present 10,000 civilian workers employed, with a daily payroll of \$51,000. Before the war 2,500 workmen were there.
