TEDDY NEVER LOOKED FOR LOVE TAPS

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—The late Colonel Roosevelt's love for athletics is clearly set forth by Robert J. Mooney, formerly associate publisher of a Chicago newspaper.

"I was in Washington August 18, 1904 working on the editorial staff of the New York Tribune during the presidential campaign," said Mr. Mooney. A boyhood chum of mine who was in government service asked if I knew President Roosevelt and if I could obtain an interview for him.

"I replied that I knew William Loeb, the president's secretary and would do my best. I called Mr. Loeb on the telephone and he told me to bring my friend to the White House. On arriving there 100 people were waiting in line. I sent my card to Mr. Loeb who appeared shortly and beckoned us to come in.

"In his private office the president greeted us, saying to my friend who was an amateur boxing and wrestling champion of the District of Columbia:

"You are the finest looking man in boxing togs I ever saw. Now tell me—how did you knock out Blank that night I saw you at the club?"

"Why, Mr. President, it was a punch like this," he replied, illustrating the punch in the air.

"Show it to me! Hit me on the chin, as you hit him."

"My friend did it, but gently.

"No, no, that won't do, hit me hard; hit me the way you hit him!"

"My friend did. He gave the president a sharp punch in the jaw.

"That's it, that's it, I got it now," exclaimed the colonel delightedly. "Now let me try it on you."

"With this, the president lit my friend and sent him reeling.

"I've sure got it," the colonel said. "I'm going to try it tomorrow on Lodge and Garfield. Won't they squirm?" And the president laughed.

Mr. Mooney added that President Roosevelt was so enthusiastic over the lesson that he immediately promoted the boy.

SMOKERS MUST PAY HEAVIER FOR PLEASURE

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—The pending revenue measure which will probably be passed within a very short time provides increased taxes on cigars, tobacco and cigarettes. Every dealer in these commodities will be required to inventory his stock on the day following the passage of the Act and to pay additional tax on such stock covering the difference between the tax paid under the present act and that provided by the new Act.

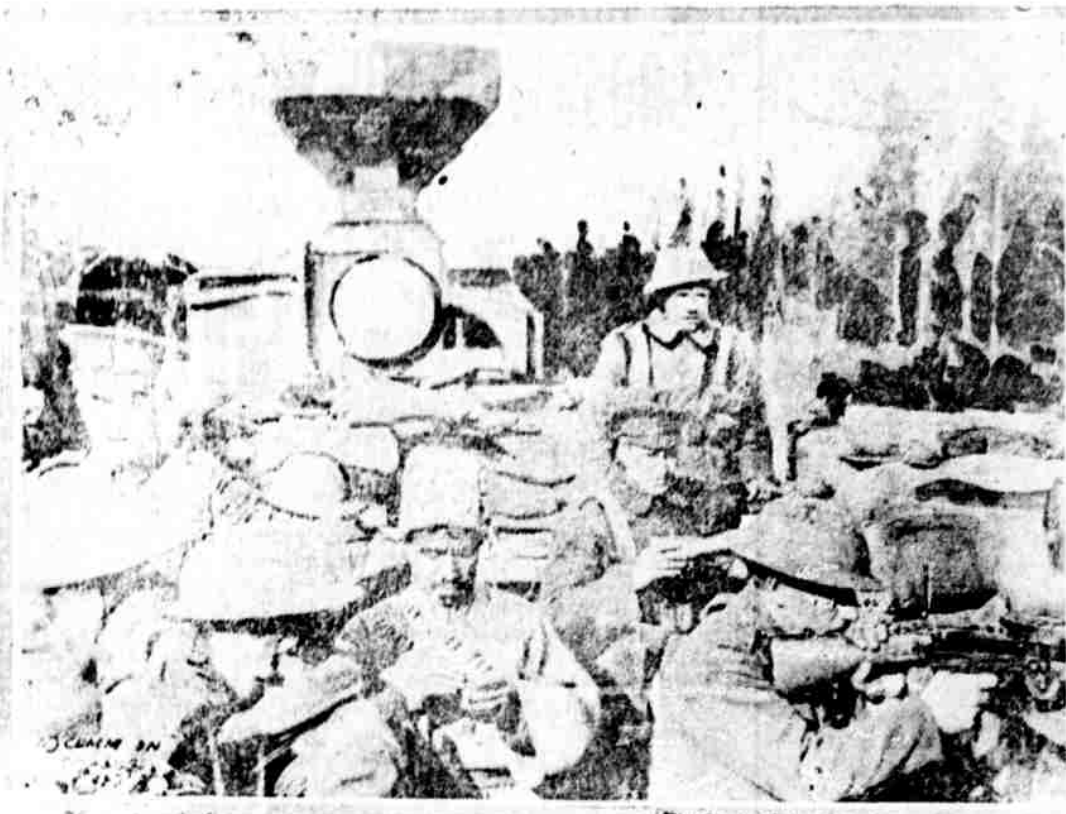
There will be certain exemptions allowed, but this matter, as well as the new rates, has not yet been definitely determined.

Every dealer should arrange to keep posted as to the date of the passage of the Act and take his inventory on that day.

Blanks for the purpose of filing inventory and return will be furnished by Milton A. Miller, Collector of Internal Revenue, Portland, Oregon, as soon as they are received from the Department at Washington. It is possible that arrangements will be made to distribute these blanks thru the post offices in Oregon but any dealer who does not receive his blank should apply for it to the Collector at Portland.

EVERYBODY TO PHONE FROM ANYWHERE SOON

LONDON, (British Wireless). "By the time the peace treaty is signed we shall be talking across the Atlantic by wireless," says Godfrey Isaacs, managing director of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company, in an interview. "One day in the not far distant future," he adds "I think we shall walk about with wireless telephones attached to our bodies and we shall be able, standing say in Piccadilly Circus, to call up a friend who is flying somewhere. Or we may have an invitation by wireless telegraphy from a friend flying in France to join him at dinner in the evening.

"Wireless telephony has been very largely used in war for communication between airplanes and headquarters and for artillery work. But there is no reason why it should not be available over very much longer distances.

"It will not be very long before one will be able to sit at one's desk in London and speak to New York practically instantaneously. Equal facilities will be available for communicating with Paris, Rome, Moscow and Amsterdam. In my view it will be as easy to speak to Sydney or Melbourne or to New Zealand.

"Long distance wireless telephony will apply also to ships at sea and to airplanes and airships."

We've often heard that Germany's pleas of militarism were bred in the bone. As we get better acquainted with the heads of her armies it certainly looks plausible.—Manila Bulletin.
