ORGANIZE A FEDERATION

One of the big factors in the development of the county will be the Water Users Association and the various irrigation districts of the county. These organizations have it within themselves to hasten or retard the settlement and development to the fullest the lands in this county that will be drained and irrigated. So great are the possibilities along this line that at first glance they seem too big to be handled without entailing much expense and labor but a further investigation will make clear the fact that this can be done through the associations indicated without creating an expense that will be burdensome to anyone.

From the data in the possession of the various associations can be compiled an exact list and description of every piece of property within the limits of the different projects, showing the acreage in the tract, the number under irrigation, the character of soil, the pot holes and alkali patches, and such other information as will give to the prospective purchaser a fairly good idea of each piece of property. These lists could be sold to different real estate offices for a fixed price, according to the acreage, or some arrangement could be made with the real estate men for a division of the real estate commission, which would be just sufficient to cover the cost of the preparation of the lists. All the farmers who have land for sale could authorize the association to represent them, and save them and the agents time and money. When all this information was compiled, a systematic campaign of advertising should be undertaken that would bring here desirable farmers, real home seekers, who would have some money to start with, and would be sure of making a success. All boom talk or highly colored descriptions should be eliminated from such a campaign, so that when a man came he would find everything just exactly as represented, and he would then be inspired with confidence in what he heard and saw.

One of the prerequisites for the successful carrying out of such a plan calls for the federation of all of the irrigation districts in the county and their affiliation with the Water Users Association. By such a federation effective work could be done along any line bearing on the welfare of the farmers of these districts, and it will have sufficient influence to secure for them prompt recognition of any reasonable demand they might make.

GET BUSY AND JOIN

Tomorrow night there will be held another meeting of the Good Roads Association, at which time the constitution and by-laws will be adopted. There will also be made a report of the number of members who have joined during the week, and it is quite essential that a good showing be made. There should be not less than 500, and, as a matter of fact, it should be nearer twice that number. Now, if you have not joined, then get busy. Don't be a slacker, and let the other fellow do all of the work that you are going to get the benefit of. Be a booster—a good fellow—and show that you are made of the right kind of stuff by exhibiting on your vehicle one of the emblems of the organization. The men who have started this movement are just like any other ordinary set of fellows: They don't want to do all of the pushing and pulling. They are perfectly willing to do most of it, and let you who have done but little, come in and enjoy to the limit the fruits of their labors, but when they see most of the people sitting back, why, they get disgusted, and ask, "What's the use?"

We know, or at least we believe, that your failure to join has not been

due to the fact that you have to pay a dollar. There may be a few with a soul so small that they will hide their manhood behind a dollar, but, thank heaven, they are few and far between in Klamath County. Such people are constitutionally dishonest. The only thing that keeps them from being out-and-out robbers is their cowardice and fear of the law. They would be a detriment to the movement, so they are better out than in. But those who have stayed out through thoughtlessness—those are the ones we want to talk to and ask them to get busy and join before tomorrow night, so that when we meet in the council chambers that evening, the report will bring out a cheer, that will resound throughout the city. Klamath Falls is filled with fellows of the right sort of stuff. They are live ones, and are showing it by the enthusiasm they are putting back of the movement for good roads.

The state legislature is going to give us some relief through changing the limitation on bonds, and when we get it we are going to take off our coats and tear right into the fight in a manner that will sweep everything before us. Klamath County is going to lead the state—Multnomah included. This Good Roads Association is the preliminary step. Let us make it a stride! BILL FOR BODY TRAINING GOES BEFORE SOLONS

SALEM, Jan. 27.—If a bill now before the legislature becomes a law physical training in the public schools of Oregon will become compulsory. The bill which was originally prepared by the physical training section of the Oregon State Teachers' association under Dr. A. D. Browne of O. A. C. as chairman, has been revised by J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction, and meets with his entire support. It also has the backing of all the superintendents of the state. It carries with it no provision for an appropriation.

The bill provides for a course of instruction consisting of such activities as will promote correct physical posture and bearing, mental and physical alertness, self control, disciplined initiative, a sense of patriotic duty, and a spirit of co-operation under leadership. It also calls for the appointment of a committee of experts by the state superintendent of public instruction which shall confer with the superintendent in formulating a program of physical education. It provides for co-operation with the colleges of the state or the federal authorities in maintaining courses of instruction for teachers and physical instructors and others who volunteer and are accepted by the superintendent of public instruction.

The bill was introduced into the senate by Senator W. W. Banks. It was given its first reading and was placed in the hands of the educational committee of the senate.

STRONG FOR GOOD ROADS
