CORFU ISLAND FOLKS DO NOT NEED WILLIAM

CORFU. (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—If William Hohenzollern, the former German Emperor should try to spend the remainder of his career on the island of Corfu, as some recent reports indicated, he would not be received by the natives with any great show of hospitality or cordiality. The villa here which he last occupied in the summer of 1914 and which he owned, is now used as a military hospital and floats the French flag. Even the especially built dock on which he was accustomed to land is now used for military purposes.

The Greek and Serbian population, many of whom are refugees, realize well the misery and suffering that Hohenzollern caused the world and are in no mood to receive him even as a temporary visitor.

"Achillion Palace," his villa, stands high up on the rocky coast of Corfu amid a wealth of cypress trees and overlooks the picturesque Ionian Sea. The snow-capped mountains of Albania are only a short distance away. The villa has been occupied lately by a number of disabled Allied soldiers, including an American sailor from Brooklyn. When the Associated Press correspondent visited it the other day the funeral of a United States Naval officer, Ensign Young of Detroit, Michigan, who died of pneumonia contracted while on duty, was being held just outside the villa gates and the simple casket, draped with the Stars and Stripes was being lowered in its resting place on the sunlit side of the sloping mountain.
