CHINESE EXPECT HELP FROM BIG PEACE MEETING

LONDON, (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—China looks to the Peace Conference for permission to throw off many of the burdens of extra-territoriality, according to information received here. The Chinese hope also to be granted permission to increase her tariffs to a point which will give the republic a chance to end the rule of money lenders and establish a more stable currency.

Under its agreement with the Entente powers and the United States to enter the war on the side of the Entente, China was to be permitted to advance its import duties from 5 to 7.5 percent. But when the details of the promised increase were discussed Japan insisted that the valuation upon which the tariff was to be imposed should be based on the average price of goods for three years before the increase. In other words pre-war prices were to hold in determining tariff duties and no real gain came to China under such an agreement.

China expects to have Tientsin restored to her, together with all the

rights held by the Germans at the time the Japanese took over German interests in Shantung peninsula the first year of the war.

All the Entente powers excepting Russia agreed to waive all payments of Boxer indemnity funds to their various governments for an indefinite time in consideration of China's declaration of war against the Central Powers. It is believed likely that the Peace Conference to soften the burden of the Boxer indemnity by further postponement or cancellation.

Immediate abrogation of extra-territoriality may not be sought by the Chinese delegation. There seems to be a disposition among Chinese statesmen to ask for the gradual extension of the jurisdiction of foreign courts over the affairs of foreigners as the Chinese courts prove themselves worthy of confidence and show their disposition to administer justice without prejudice.

The presence of foreign legation guards in the legation section of Peking has always been very galling to the Chinese authorities. Repeated efforts have been made to have these foreign armed forces removed, as they are a constant reminder of the lack of confidence in the Chinese government on the part of the powers which suffered so bitterly in the Boxer rebellion. It is expected that the Chinese delegation at Paris will endeavor to get the Entente powers to agree to withdraw these guards after the Chinese republic shall have created a suitable native guard for the foreign legations and shall have demonstrated its effectiveness in protecting foreigners against violence.

In return for the proposed abolition of extra-territoriality China will be prepared to extend to foreigners the right to reside in sections of the republic now closed to foreigners. At present non-Chinese may not establish a residence legally except in treaty ports. Many of the large and little known interior cities of China have not been opened by treaty.

The principle of extra-territoriality, by which foreigners are subject to the jurisdiction of officials of their own nationality, has been accepted by China since the seventeenth century. Until extra-territoriality was abolished in Japan, Chinese officials did not resent it keenly. But discrimination between the two countries on the part of world powers has intensified the desire on the part of the Chinese to exercise jurisdiction over foreigners.

EX-EMPEROR IS VERY BUSY NOW WITH BUCKSAW

AMERONGEN, Jan. 29.—(By the Associated Press).—Sawing wood continues to be a favorite occupation

of the former German Emperor, who spends several hours each morning and afternoon within the castle grounds working hard, while several men servants respectfully hand him logs and then pile the short sticks in heaps for use later in the furnaces of the castle.

The shortage of coal in Holland compels the burning of wood, plentiful supplies of which are obtainable from the surrounding estate. William Hohenzollern works so well that he is able to furnish the entire consumption of the castle fires. The former Emperor rarely speaks to his attendants while at work.

The two moats which encircle the castle are covered with ice sufficiently thick to bear skaters. The villagers, however, have been given to understand that the accustomed permission to skate in the moats cannot be afforded while the former Emperor is in the castle.

There are various reports in circulation concerning the alleged intention of the former German Empress to return to Potsdam. The former Empress it is said, has no intention of leaving her husband in Holland.

For several weeks nothing has been heard from the former German Crown Prince, who remains virtually alone at his home on the island of Wieringen.

Several more members of the former Emperor's suite are about to leave for Germany, where, as state servants, they must place themselves at the disposal of the government or forfeit their right of pensions. Lieutenant-General von Esterff, whose wife is an American, will continue to devote himself to the former Emperor. The General has resigned his rank in the German army.

CHAMPION OF WORLD WILL RE-ENTER RING

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—A purse of \$100,000 has drawn Jess Willard, the heavyweight champion, out of retirement.

Tex Rickard, promoter of the Joe Gans-Battling Nelson fight, and the heavyweight championship battle between Jeffries and Johnson, has obtained Willard's signature to articles to fight any opponent selected for him. He agreed to box any number of rounds up to forty. The match will be decided next July, probably on the Fourth. Willard will receive \$100,000, win, lose or draw.

The champion came to terms with Rickard after two days of arguing. Rickard said either Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight, or Jack Dempsey, who has been clamoring for a match with the champion, would be Willard's opponent. Rickard reserved the right to wait until March 25 before making the selection. The place for holding the battle will be named 60 days before the contest.

The fight will be Willard's first since he met Frank Moran of Pittsburgh in New York in March, 1916. Rickard promoted that match.

Under the agreement, the champion will deposit \$10,000 with a

Chicago bank at once to be forfeited to Rickard if Willard fails to carry out his promises. Rickard agreed to deposit \$10,000 tomorrow, \$15,000 sixty days before the date of the contest, and \$75,000 forty-eight hours before the battle.
