

# MATHER FAVORS INCREASING OF NATIONAL PARK

PORTLAND, Jan. 31.—Increase in the area of Crater Lake National Park is urged by Stephen T. Mather, director of national parks, in his report, which has just appeared. Diamond lake, Mount Thiessen and other scenic features of really national importance will be included, according to Mr. Mather, if the measure before congress is adopted. He adds:

"When the park has been enlarged as proposed by this measure, an opportunity will be afforded for development to a very much greater extent the camping facilities of this region. Diamond lake will lend itself to development as a fishing resort of great importance and other recreational features will be added that will, in a few years, make this park as great a resort as most of the very big national parks. This is its manifest destiny. Furthermore, the development of the park will be more satisfactory from the point of view of the development of first-class transportation, hotel and camp accommodations, because the traveling public can be induced to spend more time in the park than ordinarily is the case at the present time. More roads will be

built, opening up unusually interesting territory, and providing circle trips that will delight the traveler. A road connecting Crater and Diamond Lakes would be a natural development. The addition will also afford better opportunities to protect the wild life of the park.

"Like the proposed extension of the Yellowstone National park, the addition of the Diamond Lake region to Crater Lake would give to the national park system something that was intended by nature always to be the property of the nation and to be developed as a recreational area for all.

"I feel that this extension proposition is what should receive the early consideration of congress. The earlier the pending bill is enacted into law, the sooner, of course, we can begin plans for the development of the enlarged park after the close of the war."

Mr. Mather expresses hope in the introduction to his extended report that tourist and recreational travel will keep the national parks well populated during the coming season. This he recommends for the purpose of "furnishing recuperation to thousands who have given themselves ceaselessly and untiringly to the cause of peace by earnest labor for the success of the war."

# MOVE TO AID RECLAMATION

**BILL INTRODUCED AUTHORIZING STATE TO GUARANTEE DISTRICT RECLAMATION BONDS. LABOR BILL DEFEATED**

SALEM, Jan. 31.—Favorable way for the reclamation of over three million acres, Representative Gallagher has introduced a resolution for a constitutional amendment authorizing the state to guarantee district reclamation bonds.

This and other reconstruction legislation may warrant a special election after the legislature adjourns.

The house today defeated the Shabel labor arbitration bill which provided for the State Boards of Conciliation and Arbitration to handle the disputes between capital and labor. The Labor representatives were against it.

SALEM, Jan. 31.—Senator Demick has introduced a joint resolution to put on the ballot a measure for restoring the death penalty for treason and murder in the first degree.

A measure governing lobbying and making the lobbyists register with the secretary of State and filed expense accounts has been introduced.

It would prevent lobbying except before committees or by printed statements.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—The War Trade Board will not take retaliatory measures on account of the import revision by England.
