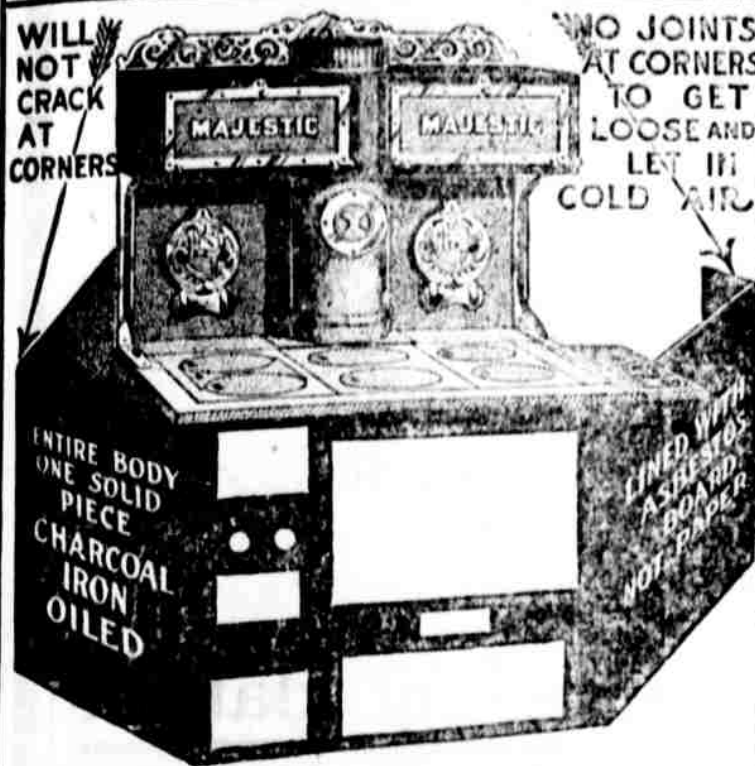

At the Theaters

"A Romance of the Underworld," which is to appear at the Liberty tonight with Catherine Calvert, as star, tells a thrilling and tragic story. The principal character is a winsome and unsuspecting girl who, brought up in the saintly and secluded atmosphere of a convent, is suddenly transplanted into the maelstrom of New York's great underworld. One Mike O'Leary, a brutal and unscrupulous political boss, attempts to get her into his power and as a result is slain and killed by her brother. The girl, Doris Elliott, is arrested for the murder and placed on trial for her life. The trial scene is one of the most sensational ever placed on the screen. It is worked out to a startling and unexpected climax, in which the hand of justice tears away the veil of mystery which has shrouded the real events of the tragedy.

"Lost We Forget," is the great screen drama for which the world has been waiting. Its historical significance will make it of value as long as the world stands. A beautiful love story shines like a star thru the darkness, the roar of battle sometimes seeming like a mighty accompaniment to the human drama being played. Many Americans unable to go abroad and engage in actual fighting or works of mercy have wished they might see with their own eyes a part of what has been going on in Europe since August, 1914. "Lost We Forget," shows far more of actual events abroad during the great struggle of decency against barbarism than any one person, whether combatant or non-combatant, could possibly see. Besides being a great love story, it is a valuable chronicle of the war.

The scenes of the Lusitania are especially thrilling. The sailing, the vast crowds of friends wishing bon voyage to the passengers, "flashes" of the various activities and amusements on board ship, are followed by the launching of the deadly torpedo from the German submarine, the filling of the vessel with water and the panic and excitement of the amazed passengers who are shown plunging into the ocean, some swimming to the small boats, others sinking to the ocean's depths. WEDDINGS BY MAIL ARE NOW PERMISSABLE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Marriage by mail for soldiers overseas and their sweethearts in this country is now permissible under a war department ruling.
 The only limitation is that the

proxy weddings shall not be countenanced where state laws make the contracts invalid.

Commanding officers, suggests the decision, can aid in case the soldiers are anxious to wed before their return.

The proxy wedding of Wales Thawes, Cambridge, Mass., soldier overseas, to Miss Annie Hiscock of Roxbury, Mass., led to the ruling.

At first the office of Acting Judge Advocate General S. E. Ansell curtly dismissed the proposition that such marriages could be contracted, but later reversed its decision.

HIDDEN LAND NOW FOUND BY TRACTOR STAGE

EUREKA, Cal. Feb. 1.—That splendid isolation that has kept the upper waters of the Klamath river almost as unknown as the depths of the Amazon is to be broken, and with its passing the Indian with his dug-out canoe will no longer race unobserved by curious eyes down to long, swirling rapids of the river.

Humboldt county has entered into a partnership with the Federal government whereby ten miles of road are to be built into the Somes Bar country in the northeastern part of the county. With the opening of this Highway a passage will be available into Siskiyou county and automobile voyagers thru the Sacramento valley will have a wonderful realm for adventure opened to them.

An almost entire lack of roads has enabled the Klamath river Indian to live in primeval surroundings until the present day and as a result he is one of the most interesting natives to be found in California. The wigwam on the shore, the papoose on the shoulders of the squaw and the tribal rituals handed down for generations still are part of his life.

Along the majestic sweep at the Klamath there remain many little Indian settlements where a white man can bargain much as in the days of old.

Some knowledge of American history has penetrated into the wilds of the region, one of the most bizarre convictions among the Indians being that George Washington discovered America.
