BOLSHEVIKISTS SEND WORKERS TO ALL PARTS

COPENHAGEN. (Correspondence of the Associated Press.) Bolsheviki propagandists were sent from Russia not only to Germany but to China, England and France, says Harold de Seaver, the Danish Minister to Copenhagen who has just returned from Russia together with the staff of the Danish Legation.

The Soviet Russian government, according to M. de Seaver, under stands very well that its only possible hope of maintaining its existence is in an international revolution and while the German revolution was nearing its apex the Bolsheviki leaders rejoiced in its progress but were disappointed in the fact that the German administration passed into the hands of the social democrats.

The only cloud upon the sky of their hopes is the position of the Entente. They say that if the Entente will do as Germany did and occupy the Baltic provinces and the Channel there is nothing to fear because in that case they would be able in a few months to revolutionize the French and British troops as they claim they already had revolutionized the German troops.

They emphasized, said the Danish diplomat, that Germany was only in her "Febrile Revolution" for Kerensky revolution and they predicted that the year would have its October revolution and more probably than was the case in Russia.

ARGENTINE STRIKERS CAUSE GREAT LOSS

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 1.—Buenos Aires has been isolated for 25 days by the port strike, which prevents the entrance of transatlantic steamers into the harbor.

The vessels alone could transport a sixteenth part of the exportable crops while an eighth part of the crops could have been moved if this number were added to the cargo carriers which have been diverted from this trade during the month because of the strike.

The loss to the strikers and ship owners alone is estimated by the newspapers at more than 10,000,000 pesos, the loss in customs has been a half-million pesos daily.

Three thousand cigarette and cigar workers struck today, paralyzing the industry.

Reparation—United States, B. M. Baruch, John W. Davis and Vance McCormick; Great Britain, William Hughes, Sir John Simon and Baron Curcliffe; France, L. L. Klotz, L. P. Locheur and A. F. Lebrun; Italy, Antonio Salandra and General Badoglio; Japan, Baron Makino and Baron Nobukaki.

International labor legislation—United States, E. N. Hurley and Samuel Gompers; Great Britain, George Nicoll Barnes and Ian Malcolm; France, M. Collard and L. P. Locheur; Italy, Signor Desplanches and Signor Cabrin; Japan M. Otchian and M. Oka.

CONTESTS FOR SWIMMERS BY WIRE LATEST

URBANA, Ill. Feb. 1.—Holding intercollegiate swimming meets by telegraph is the latest innovation in the Western Conference. All aquatic meets in the "Big Ten" this season will be conducted by telegraph, according to E. J. Manley, coach of the University of Illinois team.

The varsity swimmers will compete with each other, or with ineligible and the opposing teams will run similar events at the same time. The results will be telegraphed. From these reports the points will be computed and the winners determined.

The new telegraph meets, Coach Manley said, will eliminate traveling expenses and will interest other than first team men in aquatic sports.
