soldier or sailor sweetheart such as every other girl has. In desperation she announces that she is the wife of a soldier whose heroism is proclaimed in all the newspapers. At once the young man's mother seeks her out and in terror Marilyn faces her, sure that she will be exposed as an impostor. But the mother takes the girl to her heart—and her home. Marilyn's story is accepted without a question and she is transformed from an unprepossessing girl to a lovely young matron.

It is now known why Marshal Joffre visited the United States in the Summer of 1917 and begged us to send immediate aid to France. The real reason for his appeal is now declared to have been the demoralizing influence of the "peace and pessimism" propaganda spread among the French armies. This propaganda is branded today as the workings of Joseph Caillaux and Bolo Pasha, whose alleged relations with Germany are revealed in the remarkable film play, "The Caillaux Case," which comes to the Liberty Theatre Sunday afternoon.

One of the fountain heads of the pessimistic talk of defeat and of France's being "bled white" was the "Rue de Valois," headquarters of the political organization of Ex-Premier Caillaux. Another was the notorious "Bonnet Rouge," a so-called pro-German publication financed by this same "evil genius of France." Another has been shown to be the traitor, Bolo Pasha, friend and associate of Caillaux and the recipient of vast sums of money from Berlin. Another was a powerful secret order in which M. Caillaux was one of the high priests.

The United States not only went to the aid of France, but exposed the nefarious schemes of her internal foes and brought them to justice.

The whole story of America's thrilling response to Marshal Joffre's plea is told in "The Caillaux Case." At the Liberty Sunday and Monday.
