

RAIL TRAVEL THRU EUROPE SLOW PROCESS

ADRIANOPLE, Via London (Correspondence of the Associated Press) Railway travel in this section of Europe nowadays, is calculated either to develop or shatter ones patience. A trip from Saloniki to Constantinople, which in peace time required less than fifteen hours, now takes a week or more. The correspondent of The Associated Press spent five days journeying from Serres in Greece to Adrianople—a distance which a fast American train would cover in less than ten hours. The correspondent travelled in a stoveless box car with Bulgarian soldiers who outdid themselves to make him comfortable.

The British army has taken over the operation of main railways in Bulgaria and Turkey, and while the wretched condition of the German locomotives which have fallen into their hands, makes extremely slow the service is unusually efficient. The traveller is always certain of reaching

his destination, however long it may take. It is this administrative efficiency on the part of the English that has made it possible for American Red Cross to transport hundreds of tons of supplies to points from Saloniki to Adrianople in Turkey to meet the urgent needs of Greek and Serbian refugees who are pouring back from Bulgaria and Turkey in ever increasing numbers.

Not only have the British authorities expedited these relief supplies in every possible way but they have at several points turned over to American Red Cross, large quantities of flour and other valuable foodstuffs. It is no exaggeration to say, if it were not for this and other help on the part of the British, the condition of returning refugees would be hopeless.
