### HUNS IN COBLENZ MUST SALUTE YANKS

COBLENZ, March 10.—All German officers and men on duty in the zone occupied by American troops must wear uniforms when they appear in the street according to a recent order issued by General Dickman today. The order is a result of a tendency on the part of certain German senior officers to wear civilian clothes to evade a general order to salute all American officers. The Germans claimed that it was distasteful for German officers of rank to have to salute American lieutenants.

The Germans were taking advantage of their positions in being able to appear in civilian clothes at will. The new order also calls for a weekly registration of each German officer and soldier on duty in this area.

#### NOTICE

Notice is hereby given to the people of Klamath Falls to have their garbage ready to be carried away on the 1st and 15th of each and every month. No accumulation of garbage under the ordinance passed February 24, 1919, is to remain on the premises more than fifteen days, except ashes, tin cans, glass and garbage of similar nature, which must be hauled away every ninety days.

The following subjects come under the head of garbage: Every accumulation of animal, fruit or vegetable matter, liquid or otherwise, that attends the preparation, use, cooking, eating or storing of meat, fish, fowl, fruit or vegetables; ashes, tin cans, bottles, glass or discarded articles of similar character; all trees, vines, bushes and lawn trimmings, dead leaves and trash from gardens.

All ashes, glass, bottles, tin cans and garbage of a similar nature shall be placed in a suitable receptacle separate and apart from the other classes of garbage above described. Persons may dispose of their garbage by burying it on the premises in accordance with the rules of the Board of Health, or the owner of the garbage may cart the same away, but no person shall engage in the garbage business except the duly authorized city scavenger, Ed Hunter, or a duly authorized licensee of the city. The expenses of garbage removal is left to private contract between the citizen and the city scavenger or licensee, but a higher rate for garbage removal cannot be charged than the following:

Contents of 10 gallon or similar receptacles not to exceed two tons per week, per tank, 25c; larger receptacles or more frequent removals at not to exceed a proportionately higher cost. Garbage and trash in piles not exceeding 1 cubic yard in volume at not to exceed 50c for each pile. This ordinance provides a fine of not less than \$5 or more than \$50, or imprisonment not less than two or more than twenty days, for the violation of any of these provisions.

## WAR-TIME ROMANCE OF PRINCESS PATRICIA OF CONNAUGHT AND COMMANDER ALEXANDER RAMSAY OF THE BRITISH NAVY



Beyond doubt, no princess is better known in Canada and the United States than Princess Patricia of Connaught (Princess "Pat," as she is more popularly called), and her romance, culminating Feb. 27 in her marriage to Commander Hon. Alexander Robert Ramsay, D. S. O., brother of the thirteenth Earl of Dalhousie, has attracted wide attention. Cousin of King George, and mistress of the Duke of Connaught, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry ("Princess Pat's") to whom she gave the colors under which most of the regiment made the supreme sacrifice for beauty, her gracious character and her cleverness have made her a world-wide celebrity.

The romance began in Canada when Commander Ramsay was an aide to the Duke of Connaught, then governor general. When the great war started, Commander Ramsay promptly returned to active service in the Royal Navy and won the Distinguished Service Order for valorous work at Gallipoli.

The princess is domestic and a very clever housewife, making many of her own garments. She is fond of outdoor sports and during her tour of Canada, with her father, the governor general, she rode her spirited horse over the mountains at

Princess Patricia and her horse at Banff Springs
