SENATOR BALDWIN

Klamath Falls and Klamath County greet Senator George T. Baldwin, who will tonight arrive home after nearly three months of untiring labors in behalf of his home county. And well may we greet him with enthusiasm and gratitude, for it has been a long time since this district has had a representative who has labored so hard, so consistently, and so successfully for its development as has the Senator. The results of his labors are already apparent. Portland and the Willamette Valley have manifested a desire to help us—a desire so earnest that we cannot but believe it is sincere. Ever since the adjournment of the legislature, Senator Baldwin has been working to stir up this sentiment of co-operation, and he returns to his home with the full consciousness that he has succeeded, and he will know when he arrives that we here know how well he has done his work.

Senator, we are glad you are back among us. We want you to know that we appreciate your efforts in our behalf, that we realize that it was through your efforts we secured the passage of the resolution amending the constitution so that we can vote bonds for highway improvements up to 6 per cent of our assessed valuation; that the good roads legislation for which this session is notable bears the imprint of your indefatigable labors; that the people of Portland and the Willamette Valley realize as never before that there is a Klamath County and a Klamath Falls within the state of Oregon; that the Pacific Coast knows the same thing, and that the financial and business interests of the metropolis of this state stand ready to help us get the railroads and highways we so sorely need to enable us to reach the highest point of development.

Our welcome tonight is but a slight token of our esteem for you and the banquet which will be tendered to you and the Highway Commission next Tuesday evening is only a further testimonial of the high place you occupy in the affection of your fellow

townsmen. We welcome you home, Senator, with hearts filled with love for you and with assurances that your enterprise and devotion to the welfare of your home people will always live in our memories.

MAMMOTH PROJECT PLANNED BY FORD

DETROIT, March 14.—Henry Ford expects to give employment to 200,000 persons in the plants he proposes to erect for the manufacture of automobiles to sell around \$300, he said.

The present Ford Motor company employs about 40,000 men, while our new company will offer employment to four or five times that number," Ford said.

Ford said his plans for the new company will in no way affect the present concern, and that Ford stock is not for sale. The concern will keep on doing business as usual.

"This will be a separate company entirely," he said. "Edsel Ford will remain as president of the Ford Motor company to protect our interests and the interests of the thousands of employees."

Ford said it was safe to state that the "old home town" would be the headquarters of the new company.

Edsel Ford said it was impossible to give out exact plans as yet, but expressed the hope that the building of the plants would be started early next year. Two sites have already been selected—one at Hamilton, Ohio and the other Green Island, N. Y. Others all over the country will be purchased later, he said.

GERMAN INDEMNITY TO BE GIGANTIC

LONDON, March 14.—(By British Government Wireless.)—The total cost of the war to the allies is estimated by the Pall-Mall Gazette at \$100,000,000,000. This does not include the damage done by the German troops in the area they occupied, especially France and Belgium.

The reparation commission, appointed by the peace conference, has decided that Germany shall pay \$40,000,000,000, this paper learns on good authority. The main point to be determined by this commission was not what Germany should pay, but what she could pay, continues the Pall-Mall Gazette.

HUNS BREAK NEGOTIATIONS.

PARIS, March 14.—Negotiations at Posen between the Germans and members of the Inter Allied Mission to Poland over the Polish frontier situation have been broken off by the Germans' belligerents. It is reported as a protest against their treatment by the Allies.
