

EX-KAISER TO BE BRANDED AS ARCH CRIMINAL

PARIS, March 14.—It will be the fate of former Emperor William to be branded for all time as an arch criminal by the solemn declaration of the nations assembled at the peace conference, to which even his own country may be called upon to subscribe in the peace terms, according to the present plans of what is believed to be a majority of the commission on responsibility for the war.

The report of this commission will be ready within a few days and the indications are that the members are harmonious on the main points. There are likely to be differences, however, regarding subordinate German officials, although at present a majority of the commission is understood to hold that they can be punished for orders given or acts permitted by them in violation of the national laws of Germany or the rules of war. Such a rule would apply to the officer who executed Captain Fryatt, but not to the executioner of Edith Cavell who, it is pointed out, might have been technically guilty of espionage. No doubt is felt as to the liability of punishment of a German officer taken prisoner of war and found guilty of atrocities.

IRRIGATION DISTRICTS TO BE INVESTIGATED.

SALEM, March 14.—State Engineer Cupper has gone to Southern Oregon, where he will inspect the Medford, Rogue River, Gold Hill and Talent irrigation districts. The Medford district, which includes 20,000 acres of land near Medford, expects to secure its water from Big Butte creek and has voted bonds in the sum of \$1,500,000 for the purpose of carrying out its work.

OREGON FIR SEEDS GOING TO FRANCE

PORTLAND, March 13.—Douglas fir forests of Oregon and Washington are to furnish seeds for reforesting the denuded areas of France. The first shipment of Douglas fir seeds was taken to France recently by P. S. Ridsdale, secretary of the American Forestry association. This consignment is sufficient for the growth of 50,000 trees.

The French government, in working out a plan for the reforestation of approximately 1,500,000 acres of woodland wiped out during the war, considered various species of trees

and finally selected Douglas fir, which is known in France as "America's most important wood." It is believed that the soil and climate of France are suitable to the rapid growth and development of Douglas fir forests.

RADIO PHONE DISTANCE RECORD IS SMASHED.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Secretary Daniels talked today by radio telephone with Ensign Harry Fagenwater in a navy flying boat en route from Washington to Hampton Roads. Communication was established at a distance of more than 150 miles, by far the longest transmission of radio telephone signals with an airplane in flight ever achieved.

S. irrigation canal to Canby street; Canby street to East street; East street to intersection of Crescent avenue at U. S. irrigation canal, and intersections, and the Council having taken same under advisement and estimates satisfactory;

Be it hereby resolved, that said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of the above mentioned streets and intersections, be, and the same are hereby approved. And be it further resolved that the Common Council hereby declares its

intentions to improve said streets, or portions thereof, and intersections in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates. Said improvements to consist of bringing said street to establish grade, the installation of concrete curbing, proper drainage and the paving of said streets and intersections with bituminous, oil macadam or other hard surface pavement, at the estimated cost of \$10,924.85 for oil macadam and estimated cost of \$18,400.00 for bituminous or concrete; and be it further resolved by the Common Council, that the property hereinafter described be and hereby is declared benefited by the said proposed improvement, to-wit:

The following subjects come under the head of garbage: Every accumulation of animal, fruit or vegetable matter, liquid or otherwise, that attends the preparation, use, cooking, eating or storing of meat, fish, fowl, fruit or vegetables; ashes, tin cans, brushes and law; all trees, vines, leaves and trash from gardens.

All ashes, glass, bottles, tin cans and garbage of a similar nature shall be placed in a suitable receptacle separate and apart from the other classes of garbage above described.

Persons may dispose of their garbage by burying it on the premises in accordance with the rules of the Board of Health, or the owner of the garbage may cart the same away, but no person shall engage in the garbage business except the duly authorized city scavenger. No Hunter, or a duly authorized license of the city.

The expense of garbage removal is left to private contract between the citizen and the city scavenger or licensee, but a higher rate for garbage removal cannot be charged than the following:

Contents of 10 gallon or similar receptacles not to exceed two tons per week, per tank, 25c; larger receptacles or more frequent removals not to exceed a proportionate price per cost. Garbage and trash in volume not exceeding 1 cubic yard in volume at not to exceed 50c for each pile.

This ordinance provides a fine of not less than \$5 or more than \$50, or imprisonment for not less than two or more than twenty days, for the violation of any of these provisions.

Garbage cans provided for in the ordinance must be placed at a point convenient for the garbage collector. 10-10t L. R. STRUBLE, Mayor.
