There seems to be a disposition on the part of some of the citizens of Klamath Falls to shirk their duty in the matter of helping in the preparations for the entertainment of the Highway Commission next Tuesday. We have watched this matter very closely and we have tried out certain experiments to prove our suspicions. We are now in a position to say that certain very well known gentlemen and interests who should have their coats off and their sleeves rolled up and actively engaged in the preliminary work are trying to sneak out of their part of the work. They seem to be laboring under the impression that after coming around and telling us how to run this paper and what a grand thing good roads will be for the county and a lot more worthless information they have done their duty, and they sit down complacently waiting for the day to come when they can start their program of criticism for some oversight or failure on the part of the men who are giving their time, their money, their energy that these barnacles may have the pleasure of joy riding over a nice smooth pavement which has not cost them a moment's time or a dollar in taxes. Now, these gentlemen had better wake up or stay asleep, after the band is thru playing, for they are riding for a bawling out if they don't. We are getting pretty tired of these fellows and we are not going to hesitate giving them some of the publicity they are so anxious to get for someone else.

The officers of the Good Roads Association of the Business Men's Association, some hustling citizens in their private capacity have done wonderful work—work the public will probably never hear of, but they are conscious in the fact that they are not slackers, and that is something worth while, anyway. But this is a matter in which every man, woman and child is vitally interested. That is why a few men should not be expected to do all the work. What is asked of the general public is very little, but if that little is contributed by each individual, it will make a showing that will be more impressive than any other one program. We want the Commission to know that ALL the people want paved highways, and we want you to make known this desire by co-operating with the men who are preparing for the reception of the Commission Monday and Tuesday.

On the front page of this paper is published a program. Read it carefully and then ask yourself what you can do to make this program complete. When you have decided on what is expected of you, then do it and do it cheerfully. When those who have labored so hard for the past weeks to bring about the present conditions see that they have your support, it makes them forget the knocks the bumps, the disappointments. Get into this thing with a heart. Don't wait to be specially invited. This is impossible. Jump right in and lend a hand without an invitation. Get your car out. If you have no car, help your neighbor get his out. Then come down on Main street and help welcome the Commission. Make it a noisy welcome. Let the Commission see we are awake, for we are. We have the widest awake city in the state. Let us make everyone who comes here realize it, and you Mr. Reader, can play just as important a part in driving home this fact as any other one person in the community. Now do it.

MERRILL SHOULD GET BUSY.
A plan has finally been evolved whereby Merrill can secure the adoption of the highway between this

city and the Modoc county line as a State Highway. The Commission has declared itself as in favor of building a highway from The Danies to the California state line. No terminus has been selected, and if the people of the Merrill country make a sufficient showing at the conference here Tuesday they will take a long step towards securing the attention of the Commission to their claim for recognition. Every man who can get here should be in Klamath Falls Tuesday. The local members of the Good Roads Association should get together and formulate plans for what they are going to ask, gather their facts in a systematic, comprehensive fashion, secure the cooperation of every interest they can and then drive home their claims. There is no time to lose.
Every owner of an automobile should be in Klamath Falls Tuesday evening to join in the demonstration that is to be staged for the Commission. Merrill wants to be a part of the program, so that the Commission will see that it is not Klamath Falls that is asking for this, but the entire county. Fort Klamath is to be here with flying colors, as will Bonanza, Dairy, Bly and every other section of the county. But Merrill is the one we all have to fight for, and we want the help of Merrill so we can make a fight that will be worth while.
