RAILROADS OF FRANCE UNDER BIG HANDICAP

PARIS, France. (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—France, as a result of the war, finds itself short of 3,000 locomotives and 100,000 cars, while the transportation material that is still nominally on the active list is badly out of repair.

To meet the growing difficulties in the matter of repairs, the state munition factories at Lyons, Toulouse and Roanne have, since the armistice, been turned with all speed into railway repairing shops.

Perhaps the biggest task before the French transportation experts is the restoration of the destroyed railway tracks in the invaded part of France. An army of 75,000 workers will be engaged on this great work for months.

The departments affected have been divided up into sections, for each of which a "chief re-organizer" has been appointed. Each of them has been required to give an undertaking that he will have his section in proper working order as regards transportation, in the course of the present year.

An appropriation of 120,000,000 francs has been made by the government to enable the railway companies to purchase rolling stock

for urgent public needs. The minister of Public Works has declared that, in his view, the restoration of France's Northern and Eastern railway systems should be made a first charge upon the war indemnity to be paid by the enemy.

Persons may dispose of their garbage by burying it on the premises in accordance with the rules of the Board of Health, or the owner of the garbage may cart the same away, but no person shall engage in the garbage business except the duly authorized city scavenger, Ed Hunter, or a duly authorized licensee of garbage removal.

The expenses of garbage removal is left to private contract between the citizen and a higher rate for garbage removal cannot be charged than the following:

Contents of 10 gallon or similar receptacles not to exceed two tons per week, per tank, 25c; larger receptacles or more frequent removals at not to exceed a proportionately higher cost. Garbage and trash in piles not exceeding 1 cubic yard in volume at not to exceed 50c for each pile.

This ordinance provides a fine of not less than \$5 or more than \$50, or imprisonment not less than two or more than twenty days, for the violation of any of these provisions.

Garbage cans provided for in the ordinance must be placed at a point convenient for the garbage collector. 10-10f I. R. STRUBLE, Mayor.
