KLAMATH COUNTY IN THE LIMELIGHT.

Klamath County is now in the limelight as the eyes of all California and Oregon are upon it. This has all happened through the introduction of a bill, in the Legislatures of those two states, which proposes to annex Klamath County to California.

The President of the Portland Chamber of Commerce has declared such a step impossible but according to law, such an act would be valid if agreed upon by both states. But we greatly doubt the probability of such an act being agreed upon by the Oregonians and this is what the president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce must have meant.

If a census of Klamath County were taken it would be found that the majority of the residents are former Californians or are backed by California interests and corporations. Many, many interests of the people of that Golden State are vested in this county which has so many valuable resources. Undoubtedly California has done much to help Klamath County.

But Oregon interests should be in this county, whose one outlet is a small railroad running into California. Portland has made many promises few of which have ever been fulfilled. If the men and businesses of Oregon were interested enough in

this valuable county they would promote Klamath's industries and give some tangible aid in regard to the proposed Strahorn Railroad.

This step taken by the Representatives of this county at the Legislature has brought forth a declaration from Portland that she is now ready to help see the Nation Cut off put through and help Klamath County receive her share of the Good Roads appropriation.

We believe that this proposition has been a valuable one to the county for it has drawn the attention and interest of outside Oregon toward us and we think that although California could give us vast opportunities for development that now Oregon is aroused she will do all she can for Klamath County.

SERIOUS RIOTS IN EGYPT.

LONDON, March 18.—In recent London riots at Cairo, Egypt which are believed to be due to Nationalist agitation, six were killed and thirty one wounded. At Tanta on the Nile eleven were killed and fifty-one wounded. It is said that the troops will be able to cope with the situation and that order will be restored shortly.

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LABOR TROUBLE IN EAST.

LAWRENCE, Mass., March 18.—Many shots were fired from tenement houses today at officers who tried to break up the parade of the textile workers here. The officers were stoned also by persons in the crowd. Many arrests were made and the most violent disturbance was made since the strike began six weeks ago.

To S. S. Hill and Hattie C. Hill, the above named Defendants:

In the name of the State of Oregon, you and each of you are hereby summoned and required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, within six weeks of the date of the first publication of this summons in the Evening Herald, a newspaper printed and published in Klamath County, Oregon, which said date is the 12th day of March, A. D. 1919;

And you will take notice that if you fail to appear and answer, or otherwise plead, within the said time, the plaintiff for want thereof, will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in his complaint, to-wit:

For judgment against the said defendants, S. S. Hill and Hattie C. Hill, for the sum of \$900.00, with interest on said sum from the 11th day of December, A. D. 1916, at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, and for the further sum of \$100.00 as attorney's fees, and for its costs and disbursements herein.

And for a decree of this Court foreclosing the mortgage described in the complaint filed herein, and foreclosing the defendants and both of them, and all persons claiming or to claim by, through or under them or either of them, of all their right, title, interest, claim, lien or equity in and to all and every part and parcel of the following described premises, to-wit:

The southeast quarter of the northeast quarter, the north half of the southeast quarter, and the northeast quarter of the southwest quarter of Section ten, in Township forty south of Range five east of the Willamette Meridian, in Klamath County, Oregon, containing 160 acres, excepting therefrom the timber growing on said land, and ordering the real property above described to be sold by the sheriff of Klamath County, Oregon, in the manner by law in cases of this kind provided, and that the proceeds of such sale be applied:

First—To the payment of the costs and expenses of said sale and the costs and expenses of this suit;

Second—To the payment to this plaintiff of the amount for which it asks judgment herein;

Third—That the balance, if any there be, be deposited with the clerk of this court for those entitled to it.

That the Court also decree that at such sale any party to this suit may become the purchaser of any part or of all of said real property, and decree that immediately upon the purchase of said property, the sheriff shall place the purchaser into complete possession of the property so purchased.

RESOLUTION

The City Engineer, pursuant to resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having, on the 3d day of February, 1919, filed plans and specifications and estimates of cost of improving Pine street, from Third street westerly to Payne alley, including intersections, and Payne alley from Pine street in a southerly direction to Main street, including intersections, and the Council having taken the same under advisement, and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory;

It is hereby resolved that said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of Pine street from Third street westerly to Payne alley, and Payne alley from Pine street southerly to Main street, be, and the same are hereby approved.

And be it further resolved, that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of Pine street and Payne alley in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates, said improvement to consist of paving said portion of said streets with oil macadam, at an estimated cost, including cement sidewalks, curbing and grading, of \$19,176.96; or cement pavement, at an estimated cost, including cement sidewalks, curbing and grading, of \$23,500.00; or crushed rock, at an estimated cost of \$18,000.00; or bitulithic pavement at an estimated cost, including sidewalks, curbing and grading, of \$23,500.00; said improvement in either event to include grading, rolling and curbing.

And be it further resolved by the Common Council that the property hereinafter described be, and hereby is declared benefited by said proposed improvement, to-wit:

bottles, glass or discarded articles of similar character; all trees, vines, bushes and lawn trimmings, dead leaves and trash from gardens.

All ashes, glass, bottles, tin cans and garbage of a similar nature shall be placed in a suitable receptacle separate and apart from the other classes of garbage above described.

Persons may dispose of their garbage by burying it on the premises in accordance with the rules of the Board of Health, or the owner of the garbage may cart the same away, but no person shall engage in the garbage business except the duly authorized city scavenger, Ed Hunter, or a duly authorized licensee of the city.

The expenses of garbage removal is left to private contract between the licensee and the city scavenger or citizen, but a higher rate for garbage removal cannot be charged than the following:

Contents of 10 gallon or similar receptacles not to exceed two tons per week, per tank, 25c; larger receptacles or more frequent removals at not to exceed a proportionately higher cost. Garbage and trash in piles not to exceed 1 cubic yard in volume at not to exceed 50c for each pile.

This ordinance provides a fine of not less than \$5 or more than \$50, or imprisonment not less than two or more than twenty days, for the violation of any of these provisions.

Garbage cans provided for in the ordinance must be placed at a point convenient for the garbage collector.

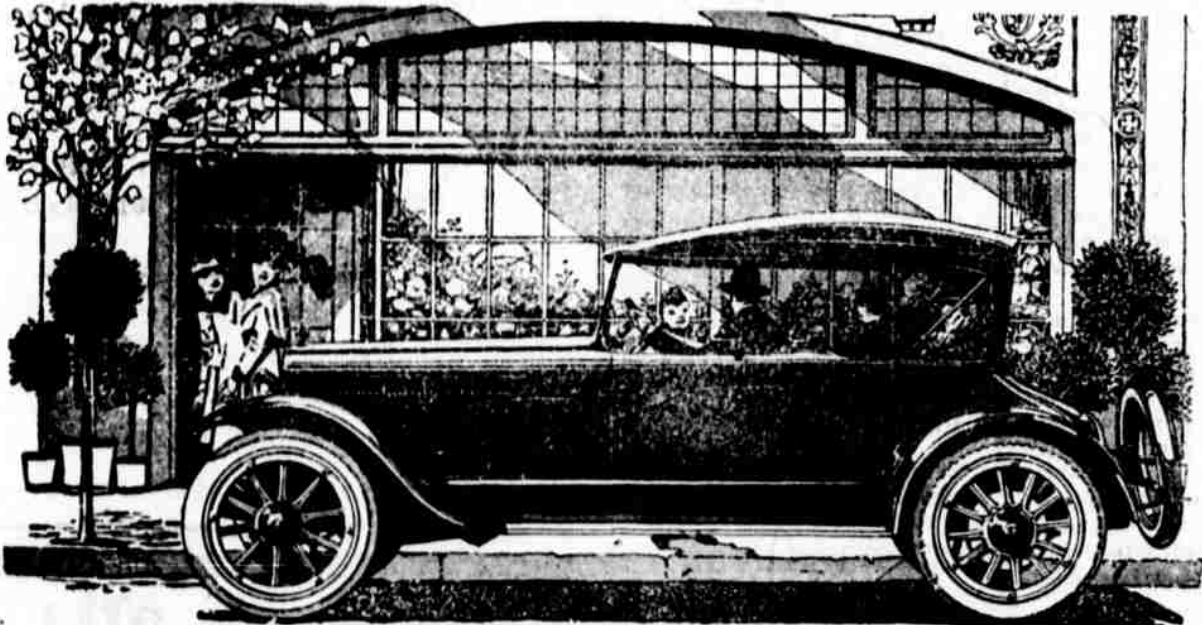
