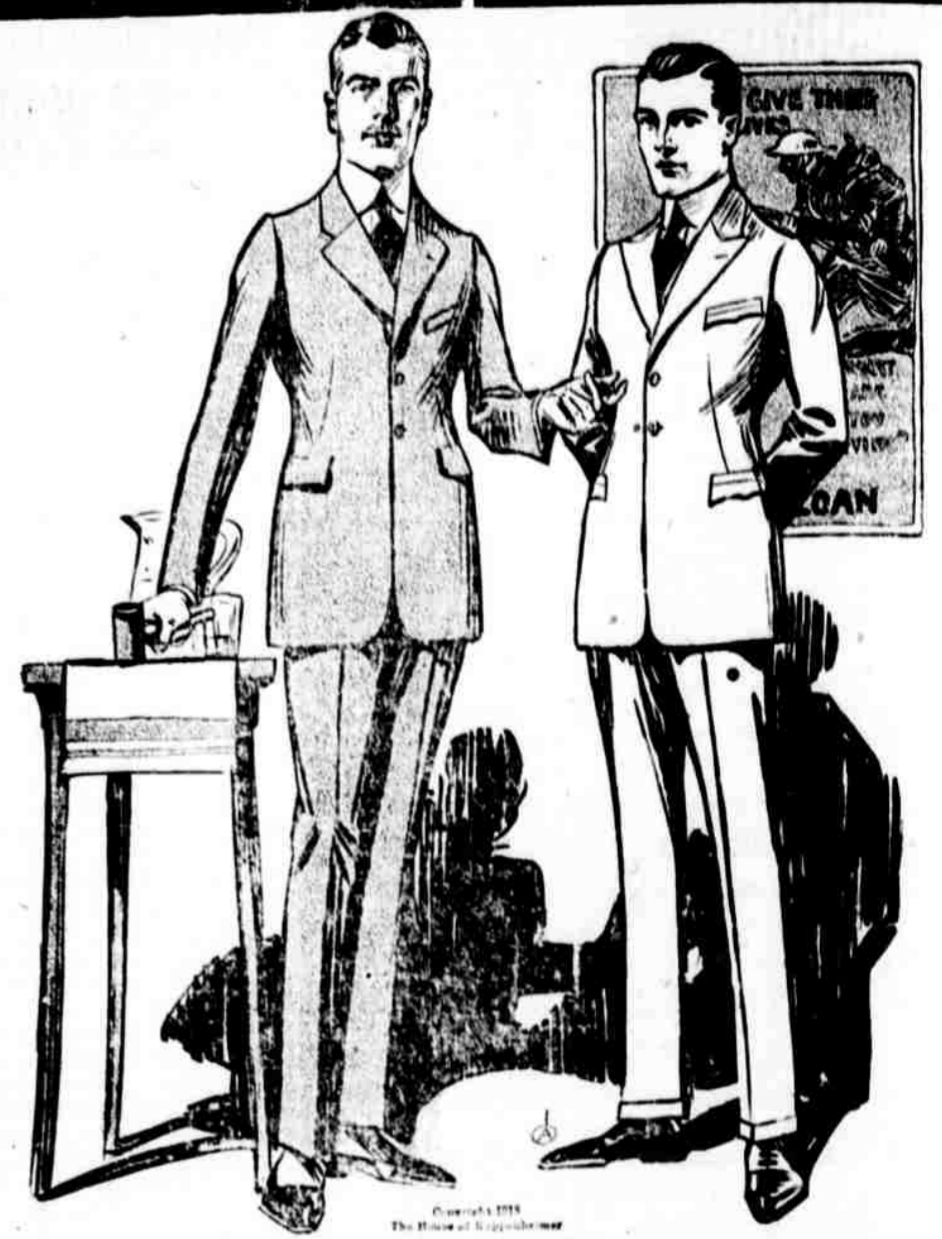
Home Scenes From a Picture Book
