ENGLAND FAILS TO AID IRISH BUILD HOMES

DUBLIN. (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Disappointment is expressed in Belfast as well as in Dublin over the policy adopted by the government to solve the problem of providing homes for the people. In England the housing schemes are said to be well advanced. In Ireland though the need is believed here to be greater, nothing has been done and the plan proposed by the government is criticised as unsatisfactory and not likely to produce the results desired.

In England the local authorities are authorized to impose a penny tax to meet the loss on building schemes and the state will provide funds necessary to cover the loss not made good by the tax.

In Ireland there is to be no penny rate. The local authorities will have to borrow from the banks the money necessary for building the houses. The Irish Local Government Board, a body appointed by the Castle and not regarded as responsible to Irish opinion, will determine what is a fair rent for the houses and the Treasury will pay part of the differences between the rent paid by the tenant and the amount necessary to meet the cost of living.

It is considered likely that the local authorities in Ireland will find it difficult to borrow this money from the banks, as these local authorities will be largely Sinn Fein bodies which probably will treat the Local Government Board as an English authority to be challenged and obstructed. Consequently the prospects of success for the Irish housing plan are not regarded as hopeful.

A good deal of the unrest in Dublin is attributed to the condition of the Dublin slums. Twenty-one thousand families, about one-third of the population, live in one room tenements. The government inspector has reported that about 8,000,000 lbs is needed for housing.

It is not believed that Dublin could borrow eight millions under the scheme proposed. Belfast is a comparatively new city and has not the same slum problem. But it has an increasing population and a great shortage of houses. It wants nearly 1,000,000 pounds for the schemes it immediately contemplates, and eventually will require 5,000,000 pounds. It has not the same hostility to the Local government Board that Dublin has, but it is about equally disappointed with the proposals of the government.
