Special Schools have been established for the instruction of men of

the Corps. Upon first enlistment, the Hospital Apprentice, second class, is sent to one of these schools, where he receives, free of charge, a thorough elementary course of instruction in the various subjects: Anatomy, First-aid and Emergency-surgery, Pharmacy, Chemistry and Compounding of Medicines, Hygiene, Care of the sick, Surgical procedures etc. Those who show special ability may avail themselves of courses in Elementary Bacteriology and other laboratory examinations and tests, X-Ray, etc.

Such men as are diligent in study, ambitious and anxious to advance, have no difficulty in gaining continuous promotion when qualified and eligible for such advancement.

### SALE OF TIMBER

Sealed proposals in duplicate, each in an envelope marked "Proposal for tribal timber," and directed to the Supervisor in charge, Klamath Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until 12 o'clock noon, Pacific Coast time, April 30, 1919, for the purchase of the merchantable saw timber on the following described lands: Portions of sections 25 and 26, T. 31 S., R. 7 E., W. M., comprising all tribal timber. The timber is estimated at approximately 3,000,000 feet, all yellow pine. The lowest bid per thousand feet, board measure, log scale, which will be considered for this timber is \$3.35. All timber must be cut, removed and paid for under regulation prescribed by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs before Dec. 31, 1919. With each proposal a certified check amounting to \$500.00 must be submitted. This check should be drawn in favor of the supervisor in charge, Klamath Agency, Oregon. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned, and that of the successful bidder will be applied toward the payment on the timber or retained as a forfeit if the bid is accepted, and the bidder fails to enter into contract for the purchase of the timber within thirty days from the date of the acceptance of the proposal. The timber must be paid for in advance of cutting by deposits of not less than \$1,000.00 each. The right of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs to waive technical defects in the advertisement and proposal and to reject any and all bids is reserved.
