BOLSHEVIKISTS HAVING LANDS RETAKEN NOW

LONDON. (Correspondent of the Associated Press)—Fresh from Odessa, an Englishman whom the correspondent met at the British Foreign Office, has given to the Associated Press the first complete account that has reached London of one of the most remarkable developments of the struggle in Russia against Bolshevism. It is the story of the Volunteer Army, organized by General Alexieff and now commanded by General Denikene, which in a year has grown

from a handful of homeless men, devoid of equipment and supplies, into a military force which has reconquered a large portion of Southern and Southeastern Russia, suppressed the disruptive elements in the region occupied and set up a working civil government.

"No one over here," said the traveler, "seems to realize that in the South of Russia there is a small force of men which under the banner of the Volunteer Army and in a cause of United Free Russia, has made against overwhelming numbers of the 'Red Terror' a most gallant stand."

The Volunteer Army, he continued, has been recruited from several classes and from every part of Russia. Fighting against great odds, it has paid a big price. Twice it has met defeat in campaigns on the river Kuban, and its losses included its leaders, Alexieff, Korniloff and Markoff, and 30,000 volunteers and Cossacks.
