

PRIZES OFFERED FOR ESSAYS ON THRIFT STAMPS

PORTLAND, April 9.—A human interest story of how to get ahead is the most interesting thing about the practice of thrift. Otherwise, it is a rather prosaic subject. Oregon War Savings Stamp headquarters is infusing some extraordinary interest in the all-the-year thrift campaign in this state by encouraging the county organizations that are pushing the sale of the baby securities of the government to offer prizes for "Adventures in Thrift."

Marion, thru its county chairman W. M. Smith; Clackamas by J. E. Calavan, county chairman; Jackson

by W. G. Ager, chairman; Malheur county thru Fay Clark Hurley, county school superintendent; and Clatsop county by J. E. Gratke, chairman, have already adopted the plan of giving a number of small prizes in War Savings Stamps and Thrift Stamps to boys and girls of school age in the respective counties, for the most interesting adventures met in acquiring money with which War Savings Stamps are purchased between January 1 and October 1, this year. The contest is to close on the first of October. The awards will be made in the various counties by the 15th.

The winners in the various counties will then be announced and the most novel thrift stories will be sent to the state headquarters for publicity use.

The three first prizes will be three \$5 War Savings Stamp certificates. These are first in each class.

The hardest work performed (time put in, kind of work and results considered) in selling stamps between January 1 and October 1, 1919.

Then there are to be 10 \$1 prizes in Thrift Stamps for the 10 next best adventure in any or all of these classes. All letters must be in by October 1, 1919. The committee of Judges will be named by the county superintendent of schools and the chairman of the war savings organization.

Thrift adventures, the instructions read, must not contain to exceed 300 words. In making the awards the judges will be guided in their estimates of the stories submitted by the following points: Composition, element of self-denial, human interest.

CLEMENCEAU SAVES LIFE OF ASSAILANT
