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

Sealed proposals in duplicate, each in an envelope marked "Proposal for tribal timber," and directed to the Supervisor in charge, Klamath Indian School, Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until 12 o'clock noon. Pacific Coast time, April 30, 1919, for the purchase of the merchantable saw timber on the following described lands: Portions of sec-tions 25 and 26, T. 31 S., R. 7 E., W. M., comprising all tribal timber. The timber is estimated at approxi-mately 3.000,000 feet, all yellow pine. The lowest bid per thousand feet, board measure, log scale, which will be considered for this timber is \$3.35. All timber must be cut, removed and paid for under regula-tion prescribed by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs before Dec. 31. 1919. With each proposal a certified check amounting to \$500.00 must be submitted. This check should be drawn in favor of the supervisor in charge, Klamath Agency, Oregon. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned, and that of the succes ful bidder will be applied toward the payment on the timber or retained as a forfeit if the bid is accepted, and the bidder fails to enter into contract for the purchase of the timber within thirty days from the date of the ac-ceptance of the proposal. The timber must be paid for in advance of cutting by deposits of not less than \$1,000.00 each.
