3 3-4 per cent, Exempt all federal, state and local taxes except estate and inheritance taxes.

CONVERTIBILITY:
All bonds will be 4 3-4 per cent at first whether you so specify or not.
4 3-4 per cent bonds may be converted into 3 3-4 per cent bonds or vice versa at any time.

INTEREST COUPONS:
Will be payable to owner on December 15th and June 15th.

INSTALLMENT PAYMENTS:
10 per cent with application before May 10.
10 per cent on July 15
20 per cent on August 12.
20 per cent on September 9.
20 per cent on October 7.
20 per cent on November 11.
Notice that 66 days elapse between the first and second payments.

If you buy one \$100 bond with 4 3-4 per cent interest on the installment plan, to your last payment due November 11, you will be required to add \$1.55 as accrued interest. Your first coupon, due a month later, will be worth \$2.89 to you.

If you are able to pay for your bond in full on July 15, the amount required in addition will be 78c. If you buy \$50.00 bond, take one-half of the above figures.

The final game of the S.O.S. Basketball championship brought the Base 3 team of London here again. The Intermediate Section team and our new gymnasium was dedicated by these teams. On the Base team from London was Trotter Bishop and we spent from Saturday noon until Tuesday morning together. Sunday Carl Grubb, an uncle, and a Klamath Falls boy came down and that afternoon Lieutenant Lee Hoag, who was in charge of the Base 5 boxers competing here was met on the streets by we three. Hoag played on the K. F. baseball team in '16. With Stanley Woods, Capt. Taylor and Clara Rounsevell also here we felt that the town had at least more than their quota of representatives here.

The S.O.S. finals for the A. E. F. Boxing Championship are being held here this week and Ralph Gruman, of Portland made a very good showing and won his event in nice shape.

Ralph and I expect to parte Amerika too sweet. Ralph will beat me home a little but he is entitled to have the first visit with the mother, as he has me beaten by two service stripes.

Woods has already left for home. The Captain and Miss Rounsevell expect to get away by June or July.

The Heralds are still coming and are greatly appreciated and notices of the boys returning has made me very keen to get back to Klamath myself.
