## EUGENE OFFERING PRIZES FOR LAWN

EUGENE, April 24.—The week of April 28 has been designated as official cleanup week in Eugene. At that time residents of the city will scour their premises thoroughly, remove trash, burn rubbish, cut grass, trim trees and hedges and otherwise make their homes attractive.

To assure active participation in the work, prizes amounting to \$125 have been offered for the best kept lawn. This amount will be divided into sums of \$25, one prize to be awarded each month for five months, beginning May 1. The city has been divided into four wards each of which has been placed under the supervision of a captain, who will be responsible for that section.

Extensive improvements are being planned, which include paving of city streets, painting of public buildings, grading and other needed work.

## KLAMATH AND LAKE WOULD JOIN OREGON

The following editorial appearing in the Oregon Journal, gives a boost for railroad transportation for this section.

The people of Klamath and Lake counties are a long way from the old homestead. When they visit their fellow citizens of the valley counties necessarily compels them to trespass upon the back yard of California to get into Oregon if they journey by rail, or to climb over more or less undeveloped mountain roads should they travel otherwise. It is easier for them to do business with California than to deal with the folks at home.

But the people of Klamath and Lake are Oregon people. They want to meet and mingle, to associate and deal with the people of Oregon. Lack of adequate transportation has made them go away from home. They have been pleading for a long time for relief.

Happily, the state highway commission has decided to build 400 miles of highway in the two counties to link them up with the rest of Oregon. Both counties are pledged to go the limit of their indebtedness in co-operating with the state dollar for dollar, while the federal government will do its share.

News dispatches give the information that he has been given much encouragement by the railroad administration and is now prepared to urge the construction upon the railway directors, who will be furnished funds for the work should they recommend its completion.

The improvement would bring a most important section into direct touch with the markets and industries of Oregon. It would make the Klamath and Lake district a part of Oregon in fact, as well as in law.

"In spite of the most elementary laws of humanity, thousands of women, girls and children of every condition were systematically abducted from their families and were forced to submit to the most odious treat-

"To prevent such crimes from ever being perpetrated again we demand that those guilty of them be punished like ordinary criminals. We trust you will exact full justice from Germany and her allies. We are nearing the anniversary of the day, April 23, 1916, when the odious deed against which the women of all nations protest, was carried out and we firmly trust that another year will not elapse before the guilty are punished, both those who issued the order from Berlin and those who executed it in the most brutal way."
