

## NATION LEAGUE VICTORY LOAN

PLANS ARE MADE FOR SIMUL-TANEOUS RELEASE OF PEACE TREATY ON ALL PARTS OF AM-ERICAN CONTINENT

PARIS, April 24 .- (By the As sociated Press) - The council of four of the peace conference, in the interval before the peace treaty is handed to the German delegates, will take up the question of making the document public, Ray Stannard Baker representing the American delega tion, in agreement with the press advisers of the delegations of other countries, has recommended to the council the publication of the treaty immediately after its delivery to the Germans. Otherwise, it is pointed out, the first version of the important provisiont of the treaty would be issued by the Germans and might be loaded up with German propaganda.

The plan proposed on behalf of the United States is for the American delegates to cable for simultaneous distribution on the American continent, first a 250 word official summary of the treaty; second a 5000 word official summary and third, the text of the treaty. The two summarion would be given to the American press at about the same time and the treaty a day or two later, the text possibly to be distributed by installments, as it was received.

The text of the covenant of the league of notions has already been cabled to the state department at Washington for release when authorized by President Wilson. Other parts of the treaty are likely to be cabled during the present week.
