

EAST OREGON ROAD REPORT

Prineville-Mitchell:—Open and in fair condition between Prineville and Ochoco Ranger Station. Closed on account of snow. Ochoco Ranger Station to Beaver Ranger Station. Autos from Prineville to Mitchell go by way of Antelope. Should be open June 1.

Prineville-Paulina:—Open and in good condition between Prineville and Paulina.

Paulina-Burns via Fife:—Open and in fair condition between Paulina and Burns. Closed on Buck Mountain, account of snow. Travelers on tour 25 miles on a good road via Gap Ranch. Buck Mountain will be open about May 1.

Paulina-Burns via Bear Valley:—Open and in fair conditions between Paulina and Burns. Closed between Lee and Burns on account of snow. Will open about May 15.

Prineville-Burns via Millikan:—Open and in fair condition.

Crescent-Fort Klamath:—Closed because of snow. No detours possible. This road should be open about May 1.

La Pine-Crescent:—Open and in fair condition.

Bend-Fort Rock via China Hat:—This road is closed at present because of snow. No detours are possible. Road will be open about May First. Auto travel time between Bend and Fort Rock, about four and a half hours.

Bend-Fort Rock via La Pine:—Road is open but in unsatisfactory condition. Traveling time between Bend and Fort Rock is about five hours.

Bend-Sisters via Tumalo:—This road is open the year around and in fair condition. It is 26 miles long and requires one and a half hours to cover it.

Lakeview-Bend:—Open and in fair condition. Lakeview to Bend. There are a few very bad places. At present travelers will make better time and encounter less difficulty by traveling down the east side of Summer Lake instead of by the more direct route, which is on the west side.

Lakeview-Plush:—This road is closed for entire distance. Detour may be made via Lake Abert and Hogback. Should be open May 15.

Lakeview-Klamath Falls:—Open and in fair condition. Lakeview to west side of Gooseneck Valley. Closed for auto travel between Drow Gap and Klamath Falls. There is still about three feet of snow in Quartz Valley. Should be open May 15.

Lakeview-Astoria:—Open and in fair condition between Lakeview and Willow Ranch. Closed by snow between Willow Ranch and Astoria, California.

Baker-Prineville City:—Open between Baker and Sumpter, but in poor condition. Suitable for autos. Closed between Sumpter and Prineville on account of snow. Detours not possible. Should be open May 15.

Sparta-East Eagle:—Closed entire distance because of snow. Detours impossible. Will be open about May 20.

Baker-Cornucopia:—Open and in fair condition between Baker and Carson. Closed between Carson and Cornucopia on account of snow. No detours possible. Will be open about May 20.

Mitchell-Dayville:—Open but in poor condition between Mitchell and Dayville. Road has no mud at present but is extremely rough and badly cut up. Machines are traveling it daily.

La Grande-Joseph:—Open and in fair condition between LaGrande and Joseph.

RULING AGAINST WIRE RATE RAISE

CHICAGO, April 28.—Federal Judge Landis has ruled that Postmaster General Burleson could not increase the intra state telephone rates. He said that he would enjoin a temporary injunction restraining the Attorney General of Illinois from interfering with the imposition of the higher rates.

130 STUDENTS TO FINISH U. OF O.

EUGENE, April 28.—Approximately 130 students will be graduated from the University of Oregon this year. Of this number 110 have already filed their petitions for graduation and the other 20 are expected to be filed within the next few days. Of those who listed 92 ask for the degree of bachelor of arts; 12 for bachelor of science; 1 for bachelor of arts in commerce; 1 for bachelor of science in architecture; 1 bachelor of law, and 3 master of arts.

The following departments are represented in the list: Journalism, 7; English literature, 9; rhetoric, 7; economics, 6; history, 6; education, 8; romance language, 8; physical education, 6; natural science, 12; mathematics, 5; architecture, 2; psychology, 2; public speaking, 1; commerce, 4; law, 1; German, 1. The present list of petitions shows that the women of the senior class outnumber the men two to one.

SEAPLANE CARRIES MAIL.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 28.—Regular delivery by seaplane of mail for officers and men of all warships at target practice on the southern drill grounds off San Diego has been announced by Commander E. W. Spencer of the naval air station at North Island.

It was started with the sending of mail pouches to the cruiser Minneapolis, at target practice drill 20 miles at sea.
