

BIG EFFORT TO STOP FIRES IN STATE FORESTS

PORTLAND, May 1.—Violators of forest fire laws are to be prosecuted more severely than ever in the relentless war, against avoidable timber fires, according to a decision in the closing session of the standardization committee of the Western Forestry & Conservation association, which has been in convention in Multnomah hotel.

"We have already put the fear of God into the hearts of a few incendiaries in our country," declared Federal Agent C. L. Hill, of San Francisco, "and I believe they will be good Indians for some time to come."

Tom Talbot of the forest service, reported that in Oregon alone there have been 1079 forest fires since 1914, of which 455 were incendiary and the balance due largely to carelessness.

Hugh Henry, manager of the Oregon Forest fire association, said that public funds were not available to carry on vigorous prosecutions, and that timber operators and others interested would have to bear part of the burden.

Frank H. Cole, of Tacoma, member of the Washington forestry commission, advocated the use of airplanes in forest service, smoke-spotting work.

Officials of the Spruce Production corporation commended the move to place in the hands of the forest service a fund of \$100,000 to meet the additional fire hazard created by the operation of the spruce division.

HUN MERCHANT FLEET TO BE WIPED AWAY

PARIS, May 1.—Germany's great merchant fleet will be practically swept from the seas, under the terms of the economic section of the peace treaty, it has been learned.

Only the smaller ships will be left to Germany. All these now held by America will remain so, being placed under the jurisdiction of Congress. It is possible some confiscated ships may be chartered back to Germany if she needs them to save her commercial life, but the earnings of ships in such an event will be turned over to the allies, putting Germany in the position of doing business through foreign bottoms. This phase was taken up with the reparations commission since ships are as valuable as gold at present and may be applied to the first indemnities payment.

A large number of German patents seized during the war will be retained, including salvarsan, German tariffs will be fixed at the lowest figure prevailing in 1914. They must remain at that figure for six months, after which Germany may raise or lower them as she desires.

All enemy property seized in the United States will remain in the hands of congress. Its disposition will be determined by legislation.

As Great Britain and France are not desirous of renewing full commercial relations with Germany at once, the United States also will reserve decision in this matter pending congressional action.

Another result of international unity will be the final recognition of the consumer as a person having equal rights with others.—Chicago Daily News.
