10,000 POLES DYING WEEKLY FROM TYPHUS

WASHINGTON, May 3 Ten thousand persons in Poland are dying each week as the result of ravages of typhus, the American Red Cross has been informed by its commission to Poland. The number of cases of typhus in Poland is estimated at 200,000.
