CONVICTION OF FOUR TRAITORS IS UPHELD

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—The conviction and sentence of Hulet Welts, Sam Sadler, Morris Pass and Joe Pass of Seattle for a conspiracy to overthrow the act declaring war on Germany has been upheld by the Federal Circuit court of Appeals. The men were sentenced to two years for issuing a circular as members of "No Conscription League, No. 46."

OCEAN FLIGHT BEGINS TODAY

NEW YORK, May 6.—Fire at the naval air station at Rockaway Beach yesterday damaged the naval seaplanes NC1 and NC4 which were to start today on the first leg of the flight across the Atlantic Ocean. The wings of the former boat were destroyed but they may be repaired for today. The blaze started from an electric spark igniting the gasoline. The start is to be made today in spite of the mishap.

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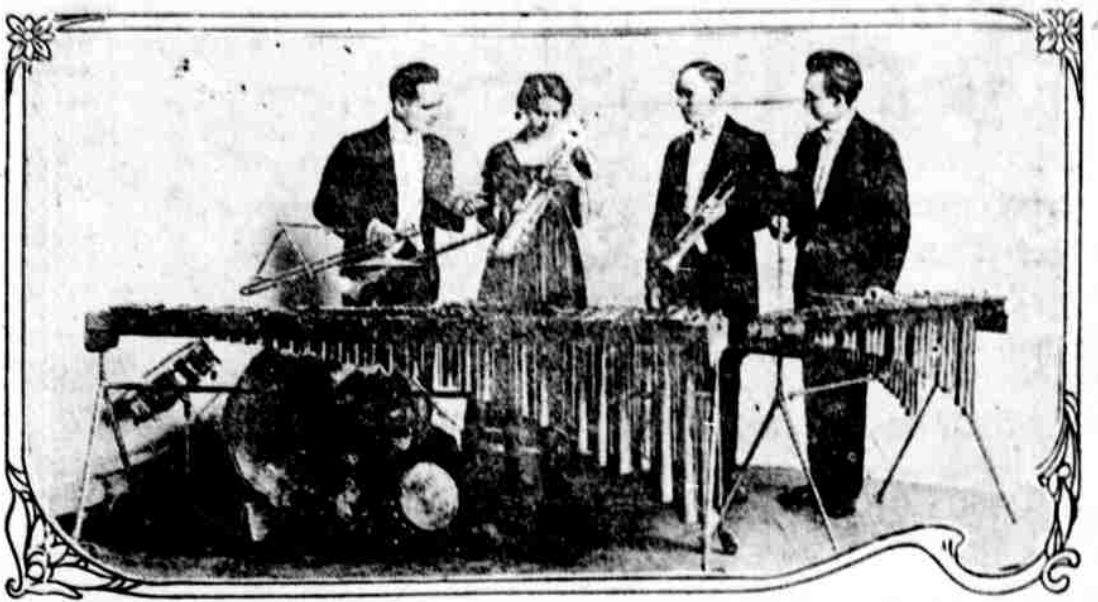
