DEARS AND DEERS COMING IN CIRCUS

Circuses have had "dears" in their sawdust arenas, but never real wild "deers," the kind that run around the woods and are shy, etc.

But Al K. Barnes, head of the big four-ring circus that bears his name, has plucked from the forests the genuine variety and trained them to perform all sorts of tricks and stunts for the first time in the history of wild animal training.

There is a herd of these deers in the Barnes circus which comes here May 12. A papa deer, a mama deer and four baby deer, together with aunts, uncles and cousins from the mossy retreats of the deer family.

It took the great showman fourteen months to consummate the task which he set himself to do. Papa deer objected strenuously to doing the "shimmy" with mama deer in the glare of an arc light before a great crowd of fool mortals to the tune of an outrageous jazz band.

The baby deer were prone to kick up their heels and object to being hauled around the arena in a Roman chariot by their parents, but Barnes, wily master hand in the art of getting animals to do things they do not want to do, at last succeeded, after months of patient training, in perfecting an act which is regarded by the circus world as one of the most remarkable of its kind. "It was a mighty hard job," said Barnes today. "I found it more difficult to train these deer than I did my lions and tigers."

"Timidity is a harder thing for a wild animal trainer to combat than ferocity, inasmuch as the spirit of the timid beast cannot be broken in the sense that it applies to the wild one."

EASTER SERVICE IN VOLCANO CRATER

HONOLULU, T. H., April 26.—(By Mail)—Honolulu today celebrated Easter Sunday in the crater of an extinct volcano. Sunrise services were held early this morning on the floor of Punchbowl, the small volcanic mound located immediately back of the business district of Honolulu. The services were picturesque and impressive.

In the semi-darkness of early morning hundreds of automobiles and hundreds of pedestrians climbed the road to the rim of Punchbowl crater and descended into the pit. At 6:30 o'clock, with the tropical sun, fresh out of the Pacific and beaming over the rugged mountains back of Honolulu, casting its radiance over the huge assemblage, the Royal Hawaiian band crashed into the first number of a program of sacred music.

Easter sermons, delivered by several pastors of the city, dealt largely with the blessing of peace which this Easter has brought to a war-weary world. The combined choirs of Honolulu's churches sang Easter songs.

GERMAN SUGAR SUPPLY IS GONE

BERLIN, May 7.—The sugar famine from which Germany is now suffering is a mystery perplexing German housewives, as sugar, owing to the ban on its export, has been a common staple even during the war. Because of the great shortage, the nation's supply of margarine seems to be completely exhausted.

Political and industrial disturbances are blamed for the restricted output of beet sugar. The factories have been shut down altogether or are running on short hours.

Large quantities of sugar are said to have disappeared mysteriously or to have been confiscated by local soldiers and workmen's councils.

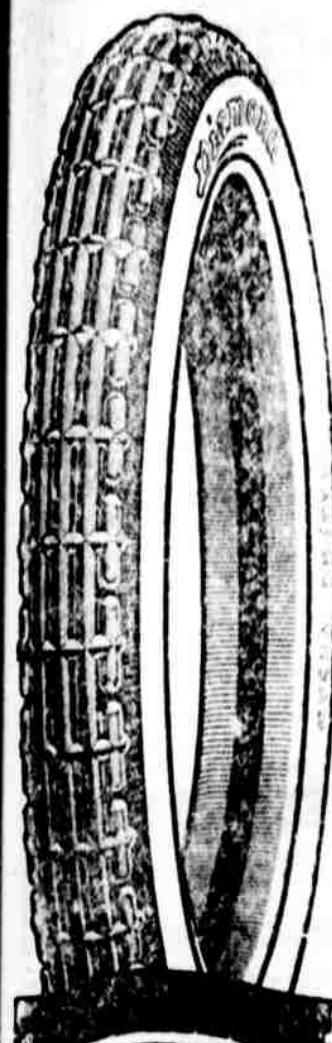
