HUGE LUMBER DEMAND NEAR

SEATTLE, Wash., May 9.—That there soon will appear a big demand for Oregon and Washington lumber and a resultant prosperity in the entire northwest is the prediction of A. W. Leonard, president of the Puget Sound Traction, Light & Power company, who has just returned from a trip to New York, Boston and Philadelphia.

"It is likely that Europe soon will begin buying Oregon and Washington lumber for the big work of reconstruction that must be started soon after peace is signed," said Mr. Leonard. "In New York financial circles it is believed this work cannot be delayed much longer, though it is not expected to start until peace actually is guaranteed."

"The feeling of confidence in the future of the Pacific coast lumber market is based more on European conditions than on the buying that is likely to come from this country. It is certain, however, that when the crops are harvested a general buying movement will be launched in this country for stocks are much depleted and the farmers and small townspeople are getting ready to build. Everywhere the promise of bumper crops give assurance of prosperity in the United States."
