THREE MILLION CHILDREN JOIN HEALTH CRUSADE

NEW YORK, May 12—With their lives pledged to the pursuit of good health, more than 3,000,000 school children throughout America have enrolled in the Modern Health Crusade, a disease-prevention movement which is being developed in the public schools of the country under the auspices of the National Tuberculosis Association and the Junior Red Cross. It is announced by Charles M. DeForest, crusader executive, at the former organization's headquarters here.

"There are now crusaders in every state in the union," Mr. DeForest said. "The health creed of the crusade has become a part of the school program in thousands of schools, both rural and urban. It has also caused innovations in the curricula of parochial and private schools. Enrollment in the movement involves something like passing a physical examination, as the recruit must for at least two weeks follow a daily health program. The child who lives up to 75 per cent of the crusader's health rules for two, five, ten and fifteen weeks becomes successively a page, a squire, knight and knight banneret in health chivalry. In health tournaments participated in by whole classes and schools the crusaders go "a' jousting for germs."

The success of the movement, according to its leaders, is due to the interest in health aroused in the children by introducing the elements of play and romance in the practice of hygiene, and by definite program with tangible rewards. So eager have the children in certain sections of the country taken to the daily "chore" idea that a toothbrush shortage is reported in Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Iowa and Oklahoma.

EAST OREGON ROAD ASSURED

DELEGATIONS FROM CENTRAL OREGON GIVEN ASSURANCE BY COMMISSION THAT DALLES-KLAMATH HIGHWAYS WILL GO THRU

PORTLAND, May 12—Central Oregon delegations urging action on the Dalles-California highway by the state highway commission received satisfactory assurances. Also the commission has mapped out work for the Bend-Burns highway and outlined odds and ends which will virtually clean up the road programme for Yamhill county.

Principally the meeting here was devoted to receiving bids, but as 52 bids were received on jobs on the Pacific highway Columbia river highway and the old Oregon trail, the mass could not be disposed of in time for awards and the commission

announced that contracts will be awarded this morning at 10 o'clock at the courthouse. The commission also sold \$500,000 worth of road bonds for \$157,500 to Loomis & Goss and A. B. Leach of Boston, this firm offering \$50 more than the United States National bank of Portland. The rate is \$93.50 per \$1,000 and is on a basis of 1.5 per cent. The former sale of road bonds was on a basis of 3.0 per cent. Fourteen bond houses and banks contested for the half million of 4 per cent bonds and the bidding was close.

For the Dalles-California highway the commission ordered Engineer Bennett to make three surveys from Maupin to Madras to ascertain which is the best and cheapest route. Jefferson county sent assurance to the commission that \$100,000 in road bonds would be voted at the June election and that this sum would be placed at the disposal of the highway commission to be used on the highway north and south through Jefferson county, providing substantial aid is given by the commission. The highway commissioners replied that substantial aid will be accorded. With this bond money and state money, the California highway work in Jefferson county can be advanced.

Connecting with the Jefferson county line will come the California highway section thru Deschutes county. Denton Burdick informed the commission that Deschutes county will vote \$125,000 in June and that \$60,000 of this will be turned over to the highway commission for co-operation on the California highway north and south. Another \$35,000 from the issue will be given to the commission for the road at the head of McKenzie Pass, going thru Sisters to Bend and eastward toward Burns. Klamath county has already promised to turn over its share toward carrying the California highway from the Deschutes line to the Oregon-California state line.

BRAZIL JOURNALIST SCORES UNCLE SAM

RIO JANERIO, May 12—Madelros De Albuquerque, who is generally considered one of the leading journalists of Brazil and who has just arrived from the United States has attacked that nation bitterly in an interview in which he accuses the country of fomenting revolutions in Mexico and says that it considers Brazil only as a possible future colony. He declares that the United States is incontestably the Prussia of tomorrow.

PLANES LEAVING AMERICAN SHORE

KOREANS ASKING FOR INDEPENDENCE

PARIS, May 12—A petition from the Korean people and nation asking for liberation from Japan has been submitted to the peace conference by the representatives of Korea. The petition asks for the recognition of Korea as an independent state and for the nullification of the treaty of August, 1910.
